Mr. J. J. Howser, of Blaine, who came near landing the nomination for joint representation, was in the city on Tuesday, and although defeated he is right in line to help elect the republican ticket. There is one thing that Mr. Howser did not like, and that was the report that was circulated about him that he was the whisky men's candidate. He denies this. There is one thing that he was said in Mr. Howser's favor, that while a number of prominent republicans refused to run for this office he was making an active campaign and came near landing the nomination, thus showing that he had nearly as many admirers as Mr. Beals. Such, however, are the uncertainties when one enters the political arena, for Mr. Howser is not the only good man amongst so many who had to abide by the will of the party.

Hon. Willis C. Hawley, republican nominee for congress, came in on Tuesday on a political tour and was well received by the people of the county. He is a fine speaker and had large audiences, his remarks being frequently applauded. He spoke at Nehalem on Tuesday evening, at Tillamook City on Wednesday evening, at Beaver on Thursday afternoon and at Cloverdale in the evening. Mr. Hawley, in discussing the political issues, dwelt upon the progress and the prosperity of the United States under republican administrations and then contrasted that with the democratic administration under Cleveland, which brought financial and industrial stagnation and a heavy bonded indebtedness upon the country. He also showed that it was the republican party which was breaking up the trusts, and in which President Roosevelt was taking a successful part. Mr. Hawley asked republicans to line up for their party in June.

**DIED RECENTLY.**

**A Niece of William Penn in Michigan at the Age of 93 Years.**

Mrs. Elizabeth Mapes, of Tillamook, has received the news of the death of her aunt, Mrs. Magdalen Berry, at Wildwood, Mich., a few weeks ago. Mrs. Berry was a sister of the mother of Mrs. Mapes, who was a descendant of the illustrious William Penn, and a brief sketch of her life is given below.

Miss Magdalen Bixler was born in Westmoreland county, Penn., April 6, 1813. In the year 1814 her parents emigrated to Knox county, Ohio, from there to Fairfield county in 1821, and from there to Seneca county, Ohio, in the year 1829. She was the wife of George W. Berry.

Miss Bixler was a great niece of the celebrated English Quaker and philanthropist, William Penn, and bore many traits of his character and benevolence; but unlike him in his religious belief, at the age of sixteen she united with the Methodist church, and remained with that organization until about 1828, when she changed her views on baptism, thinking she was not following the teachings of the lowly Nazarene as closely as ought to be done; was immersed and associated herself with the Church of Christ at Lisbon, then under the leadership of the Rev. William Dowling, and remained with that body until the time of her death. No book was studied by her as much as the bible. It was her aim in life to do good to everyone, and she was universally loved by all who knew her as "Aunt Matty."

A noble life has gone out, only to be lit in the silent beyond, where her name will appear on the Golden Scroll in memory of the good deeds done for her associates in this life.

Kind hands have laid her to rest on the hill top of Oak Hill cemetery, overlooking the placid face of Burnt Lake, whose waters spread out like a silver landscape in the distance, while the silent waters of Indian river sweep past; fanned by the morning breeze kiss the shores of her last resting place, while mingled with the sweet music of the evening songster, and the unwearied songs of tall evergreens will chant above her their everlasting anthems of praise and benediction.

FOREST GROVE, Or., May 3.—The Portland-Nehalem-Tillamook railroad is now within a short distance of the little town of Banks, eight miles north of Forest Grove.
