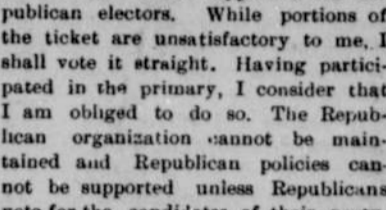

**Sensational Confession.**  
 Full confession was made by James Remington, the "Cockney Kid," to Police Detective L. C. Hartman, of Portland, at St. Helens, showing that the recent assault on W. C. Fischer, the editor of a reform paper at Rainier, was the result of a conspiracy on the part of saloon-keepers at Rainier and Portland. Warrants were issued at St. Helens for the arrest of Pierce, a saloon-keeper; Brough and Wilson, barkeepers, and a boatman of Rainier. \*  
 A dispatch from St. Helens says: A. D. Pierce, owner of the Pierce cafe and saloon, and Bartender Wilson, for Lee & Capell, of the Log Cabin saloon, were arrested at Rainier by Sheriff White and brought to St. Helens charged with complicity in the assault on W. C. Fischer. The Circuit Court meets and a number of criminal bills in connection with the liquor traffic will be presented to the grand jury. Feeling is high against the arrested men, not only on account of the attack on Fischer, but because the confession of the "Cockney Kid," who brutally beat him, shows that Rev. H. G. Kemp, who has taken an active part in the crusade against the immoral element, and also marked as a victim of the thug and escaped death or serious injury only by a fortunate combination of circumstances.
