Republican Meetings.

Four republican meetings were held in the county this week, which were addressed by Mr. E. B. Tongue, of Hillsboro. Monday afternoon he addressed a good meeting at Cloverdale and in the evening spoke at Woods, where he had another good meeting. Tuesday evening he addressed a meeting in the opera house, when there was a good turnout, when Mr. Tongue made a fine speech. Mr. W. H. Cooper, state committee man, introduced the speaker, who immediately started in to answer Governor Chamberlain, who had been claiming a great many things which he was not entitled to, and dwelt upon this at some length, satisfying his audience that the governor was not the business manager he was represented to be. Mr. Tongue characterized the attack on Dr. Withycombe because he was foreign born as un-American, stating that the democrats would allow foreign born citizens to vote, but that they were not good enough to hold office, whereas the republicans took the position that foreign born citizens were good enough to vote and good enough to hold office. Mr. Tongue said foreign blood circulated through his veins, but he would not yield to anyone in loyalty to his country. Mr. Tongue pointed out the importance of republicans supporting the entire ticket, for having taken part in the primary election, they were, he thought, morally bound to support it. Mr. Tongue spoke at Bay City on Wednesday and left for home on Thursday.

Twenty Miles of New Logging Road.

The Chapman Lumber Company, of Portland, has begun the construction of a 20-mile logging road from Seapooose westerly into the dense fir forests of Columbia County. The estimated cost of the road is \$100,000, and the company hopes to complete the track by next winter. M. B. Golden has the contract for grading the right of way, and has a large force of pick and shovel men at work. Two pile-drivers are operated along a two-mile stretch near Seapooose where considerable trestle work is to be built.
 "An easy grade of two per cent has been secured all the way up," said Mr. Golden. "and the lumber company is already establishing camps a few miles out, where an immense body of heavy fir begins. The road will be of standard gauge, and its ultimate destination is Tillamook. When it reaches that portion of the coast it will serve to connect Portland with a large scope of fertile country that has long been tributary to San Francisco, although in a straight line not more than 60 miles from this city."
 "Seapooose, which is 20 miles north of Portland, is booming as a result of railroad construction. Many buildings are going up, and the prospects are good for a busy building season there all the year."

JUDGE CONDER AND HIS THAYER CONTRACT.

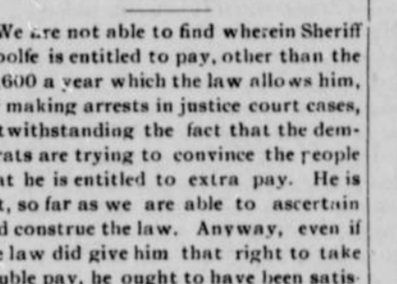
Some Facts People Ought to Know -- Peculiar Method of Conducting County Affairs.
 A good many things are being said, and a good many mistakes are being circulated, and a good many so-called explanations are being made in regard to the famous contract County Judge Conder entered into with Handley & Thayer for the recovery of Alderman's shortage and delinquent taxes. This is a public matter and is open to discussion and criticism. The Headlight has often criticized this contract, and will probably do so again before the affair is settled, but it is not our intention to do so at the present time, but simply to give the facts so that our readers may be fully advised what has transpired and what is liable to transpire. When Handley & Thayer was employed they were paid a retainer's fee of \$100 and Judge Conder entered into the following contract, which neither of the commissioners saw until they read it in the Headlight:
 "It is hereby agreed by and between Tillamook County, Oregon, and the law firm of Handley & Thayer, shall as attorneys for Tillamook County, Oregon, immediately commence to enforce by all necessary and practicable legal process all claims which the said county has against anyone by reason of the delinquency of H. H. Alderman, late sheriff and ex-officio tax collector of said county, and by reason of any other delinquency of any person liable to the said county on any account and shall diligently prosecute the same to a determination."
 "Provided no suit or action in the courts shall be instituted without the sanction of the County Judge of said county and the said Handley & Thayer shall receive as compensation for services, five per cent of \$1,600 delinquency of said H. H. Alderman, secured by tax collector's bonds if the same is made without legal process, if with legal process, ten per cent thereon."
 "Twenty-five per cent of all sums made on account of the aforesaid sheriff and tax collector's delinquency, in excess of the aforesaid \$1,600; and 40 per cent on all sums made on any other claims due the said county; a retainer of \$100 to be paid on the execution of this contract."
 "Executed in duplicate."
 "Witness our hands this 7th day of September, 1906."
 "TILLAMOOK COUNTY, OREGON."
 "By W. W. CONDER, County Judge."
 "HANDLEY & THAYER."
 It is now two and a half years since the shortage was discovered, and the county is not in court yet, but heretofore the miserable showing made:
 First—Claim presented against the estate of H. H. Alderman, to Judge Conder and allowed by him.
 An appeal was taken from this allowance to the Circuit Court, and after a change of venue was had to Yamhill County, the case was dismissed at the County's expense. The expense being very heavy, as Max Crandall was brought as a witness from Eastern Oregon and received double mileage.
 Second—Suit brought against Homer Mason in attempt to recover fees for work done in the matter of U. S. Lane Office business. Suit brought Jan. 21, 1905. On April 19, 1905, this case was dismissed, with judgment against the County for costs and disbursements.
 Third—Suit was brought against Edith M. Alderman to set aside deeds, on March 3, 1905, and after various proceedings therein the same was dismissed with judgment against Tillamook County, for the costs and disbursements.
 Fourth—Suit brought in Multnomah County against Mrs. Alderman, as administratrix, on account of tax matters. Dismissed with judgment against Tillamook County for costs and disbursements.
 Fifth—Four suits filed Oct. 28, 1905, against Mrs. Alderman and the bondsmen of H. H. Alderman, for shortages claimed in tax collections. These matters are still pending, but we are advised that the County's attorneys expect that two of these will be dismissed by the court (of course with judgment for the costs against the county). The liability of the bondsmen in other cases will not amount to as much, in any event, as the county could have settled the matter before suit was brought, and which, we are informed, the county would be willing to accept to-day, with the added prospects that of the county may entirely fail in all of the suits.
 A question was raised, when the last term of the circuit court was in session, whether Judge Conder's contract with Handley & Thayer was legal, and District Attorney McNary gave it as his opinion that the contract was an iron bound contract, took the matter entirely out of the hands of the district attorney's office, also out of the hands of the county court, and all that the latter can do is to allow the commission and pay the costs of the foolish suits that were brought and knocked out in the courts. There is no truth whatever in the report that certain parties went to the district attorney and asked him to quash the whole proceedings, but they did go to him and obtained the above facts, for the reason that Mr. H. F. Goodspeed had been asked what he would do with the Conder-Thayer contract when he became county judge, when it was found the next county court's hands would be tied and his mouth gagged.
 No sooner had the contract been signed when Handley & Thayer took upon themselves the collection of delinquent taxes and sent out a number of circulars to those who owed back taxes, and in doing so sent a lot of duns to those who had paid their taxes and held receipts. Some people became quite indignant on account of this. Whenever Sheriff Woolfe received a letter saying the parties wanted to pay their back taxes, this was turned over to Handley & Thayer, thus showing that they were running that part of the sheriff's office, and thereby making fees for Handley & Thayer to be paid by the county.
 It will be noticed that the contract

SHERIFF'S DOUBLE PAY.

Law Allows Him \$1,600 a Year--Not Entitled to Extra Pay for Making Arrests.
 We are not able to find wherein Sheriff Woolfe is entitled to pay, other than the \$1,600 a year which the law allows him, for making arrests in justice court cases, notwithstanding the fact that the democrats are trying to convince the people that he is entitled to extra pay. He is not, so far as we are able to ascertain and construe the law. Anyway, even if the law did give him that right to take double pay, he ought to have been satisfied with a salary of \$1,600 a year, which a large number of taxpayers would like to receive. But if Sheriff Woolfe can construe the law that he is entitled to the double pay, we cannot, so we say the money he and his deputy have drawn for making arrests ought to be returned to the county. For the information of our readers we will give the law bearing on the subject:
 "It is the duty of the sheriff, as laid down in subdivision 2, Sec. 1017, Bellinger & Cotton's Oregon laws. "To execute the process and orders of the Courts of Justice or of judicial officers, when delivered to him for that purpose, according to the provisions of this code or other statute."
 In Chapter XX of title XVIII are found the following provisions: Sec. 1580 provides in regard to a warrant of arrest that "If the warrant be issued by any other magistrate than a justice of the supreme court, it must be directed to any sheriff or constable of the county in which it is issued."
 By Sec. 1583 the statute expressly says that a justice of the peace is a "magistrate."
 Sec. 1586 gives the form for a warrant of arrest, and according to that form, the warrant is directed "To any sheriff or constable of the county of ---."
 Sec. 2267 in relation to criminal proceedings before justices of the peace provides that "A warrant of arrest in a criminal action is issued, directed, and executed in all respects as the warrant provided for in chapter XX, of title XVIII, except that it must be made returnable only before the justice who issues it."
 Sec. 2202 in relation to serving summons in justice court provides "The summons must be served by the sheriff of the county or his deputy, or any constable of any precinct in the county, or by a marshal of any incorporated city or town within the limits of such city or town."
 Sec. 2931 provides salaries for the sheriff of the various counties. The sheriff of Tillamook county, receiving \$1600.00 and \$900.00 for a deputy.
 Sec. 2935 provides that the salaries provided for in favor of the said sheriffs, &c., are to be paid by the various counties, "and no one of such officials shall be entitled to receive any fees or other compensation for his services than as above provided, and
