America for Americans.

The true inwardness of the Chamberlain anti-foreign or know-nothing movement is shown with unexpected frankness in a letter which The Oregonian has received from Mr. Eldridge, of Ashland. This indiscreet admirer of the Governor expresses himself thus: "Our motto is America for Americans. We want Chamberlain to succeed himself because he is a true-blue American." This, then, is the doctrine which is being secretly propagated throughout the state and which Mr. Eldridge in his zeal for a little notoriety has blabbed. "America for Americans" is the issue upon which the Democratic party stands in this campaign. It is the principal which Mr. Chamberlain represents. It is the party slogan of his followers.

"America for Americans" gives notice to the world at large that Oregon has no use for immigrants from other countries, or for foreign-born immigrants from other states. Mr. Chamberlain and his followers have no use for the Germans who have made the greatness of Illinois, Missouri and Wisconsin; for the Swedes and Norwegians who have built great commonwealths upon the prairies of Dakota and Minnesota. They desire no immigrants except Americans "born to the soil," as this spokesman of the Governor puts it.

We accept this issue squarely and unflinchingly. The Republican party is opposed to know nothingism and to all the baneful narrowness, ignorance and race hatred which it implies. We welcome to Oregon every good citizen, no matter where he was born or what language he speaks. If, like the Chinese, a foreigner is incapable of becoming Americanized and tends to lower the standard of our civilization, we have no place for him; but if he comes desiring to develop his free manhood under our institutions and take a citizen's part in our industrial and political life, we give him a hearty welcome. We believe that a good foreign-born citizen is just as worthy of political preferment as those who are "native to the soil." We believe that much of the best in our National life we owe to foreigners, and we are willing to receive more of the same sort from the same source. One or two generations back we were all foreigners, or nearly all. The taunt against any citizen that he is not "native to the soil" is a stench in the nostrils of true Americans. It is narrow, bigoted, indecent, unpatriotic.

Shame to the candidate who, to support his tottering cause, must insult millions of American citizens just as worthy and far more patriotic than himself. Shame to the party which can advance no better reason for supporting its candidate than the fact that its opponent was born in foreign land and has chosen America for his home in preference to all the world besides. It is a reproach to Mr. Withycombe that he loves America well enough to live here? It is a reproach to him that his fellow-citizens have asked him to stand for the highest office in their gift? Do the voters of Oregon disgrace a man when they ask him to accept public office? Is it a crime to obey when they call one to high preferment? It seems so; for Mr. Withycombe is vilified almost as much because he ventures to run for office as he is for being a foreigner.

Not much of a foreigner, after all, though that makes no difference. Still facts are facts. Mr. Withycombe has lived in Oregon thirty five years, ever since he was a boy. How long does it take for our rains to wash off the dreadful taint of foreign birth? During all that time he has performed the duties of citizenship, and performed them well. If he delayed completing the forms of his naturalization ceremony, it was because he had been advised that he was already a full citizen by virtue of his father's naturalization. As soon as he became convinced of his error, if it was an error, he corrected it. Who could do more or better? It is not to be believed that Mr. Withycombe will lose a single vote because of this infamous attempt to discredit him on account of his foreign birth. It is much more credible that the self respecting and patriotic citizens of Oregon will punish the disgraceful attempt to introduce such an un-American and thoroughly pernicious issue into the campaign by largely increasing the plurality which he would normally receive.—Oregonian.

Against Woman Suffrage.

Even at this age of the world, with all our boasted enlightenment, many people have queer ideas of what socialism means. Many confound socialism with anarchy, "dividin' up" of property, "killin' off" the capitalists, and other rank absurdities.

Socialism means simply the realization of "Equal opportunities for all, and special privileges for none." This can be realized only by the public ownership and democratic management of the means of production and distribution, the same being in the interest of all the people, and not for part of the people, for and by the people; and if you are honest enough to investigate for your self, you will find that socialism marches with thought, no doggers; it brings peace, not war; it acts upon the plane of love, not hate; it stands for progress and knowledge, not destruction, ignorance and death; it has but one great enemy, and that enemy is, and ever will be, ignorance. Ignorance crucified the Christ, for His last words "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do" prove it. Socialism implies such an intelligent and systematic rearrangement of economic affairs as will, by conservation of our energies, provide for all the material requirements of our daily living and leave opportunity for a large and accelerated ethical growth. It is a form of society based upon conditions which require productive labor by all, and which provides leisure for all, and culture for all. It calls for such readjustment of our industrial order as will bring labor-saving machinery to be a direct and full assistant to the laborer, and thus insure to the worker the entire product of his toil. A comprehensive study of socialism clearly reveals that, under a reasonable advanced state of socialist society, a very few hours of daily labor on the part of each able bodied man will provide for the family all the modern conveniences and comforts of life, including many of the luxuries.

This condition of society is to be attained through a co-operative organization of industry, based on the public ownership of land, mines and produc-

ive capital in place of our present destructive and wasteful strife for gain of private capital. Socialism implies emulation—yes, rivalry—in accumulation of public wealth, and in all good works tending to the material and ethical welfare of society as a whole. Its motto is "Each for all, and all for each." I will say in conclusion that socialism will make the conditions possible for mankind to live the Golden Rule, then, and then only can true Christianity prevail. Then, and then only will the divine injunction be operative that "if a man will not work, neither shall he eat." For a man to receive the nomination of representative bound by these principles, is a sufficient guarantee that the interest of the producing class will be his guiding motive, first, last, and all the time, that a county judge and commissioners would handle the toll road and all other questions subject to the will of the people and that other offices would be conscientiously administered.

If you are a true Christian you believe socialism to be right. You know the present conditions are not right. Why sanction it by your ballot? Why not look for a higher ideal than the graft system? Why not investigate the principles of socialism and scientific government?
