THE COAST COUNTIES WANT A "SQUARE DEAL."

Agitation for Coast Improvements—The Situation in Tillamook—Engineers Gave County a "Black Eye."

The improvement of the harbors in the Coast Counties of Oregon is a matter which is going to be an important issue from now on, for this section of the state has been shamefully neglected and its development and progress retarded for the want of improvement in the harbors and bays along the Coast. We have no fault whatever to find with the enormous sums of money which have been expended for the improvement of the Columbia and Willamette rivers, but it does look to us that a few more of the crumbs that fall from the rich man's table should have been given to the Coast Counties, so that they could keep pace with the industrial growth of the state. Local enterprise and grit have accomplished a great deal to overcome difficulties, but when they have bucked up against the transportation difficulties, or a way of getting the products of the farm or the forest to market, is a problem which a large number of enterprising men have had to succumb under, simply for the want of harbor improvements. What are the conditions in Tillamook, which is probably the most neglected county, yet the richest in undeveloped resources, in Oregon or along the Coast? Tillamook has the enormous amount of forty billion feet of merchantable timber tributary to Tillamook and Nehalem bays, yet there is only one saw mill cutting lumber for the export lumber trade, and at a time when lumber is in big demand and at a good price. The reason of this stagnation is the need of harbor improvements, and they are urgently needed right now. What a different state of affairs would exist today if the government had undertaken the project to improve Tillamook bar, for this county would have become the lumbering center of Oregon, for where there is now but one saw mill engaged in the export trade, several dozen large saw mills would be running, giving employment to thousands of men. But, alas, it was not for the want of enterprise in furnishing the government with plenty of data, nor was it because the U.S. district engineer's office, after carefully looking up the resources, estimating the cost of improving Tillamook bar, which reports show it recommended on account of the enormous resources and bottled up condition of the county, but Tillamook was ignominiously turned down at a time when it fully expected and was entitled to harbor improvements, by the Board of Engineers at Washington making the stupid and illogical report that Tillamook was too near the Columbia river for the government to undertake another jetty project. To provide a 15-foot channel, the government engineers estimated that it would cost \$855,789. In view of the enormous resources of the county, this is comparatively a small amount of money for the great benefit that would be derived, and as one of the long bottled-up, isolated Coast Counties, it would have been a godsend had the national government undertaken the project, which was recommended by the local engineers. We will quote part of the Board of Engineers report to show what an absurd, illogical argument it put up against the improvement of Tillamook bar. But there it stands, as a black eye against any further effort to improve the bar, or until such time as the Oregon delegation can remove the hoodoo or convince the Board of Engineers that a country with forty billion feet of standing timber and other valuable resources is entitled to an outlet and more equitable treatment at the hands of the engineer's department at Washington. This is part of the report we referred to:

"The country contiguous to the bay is rich in forest and agricultural resources, and undoubtedly the products of field and forest will increase with time and with the settling up of the country. At the present time, however, the contrast between the commerce present and reasonably prospective and the sum required to provide even the lesser of the two channels referred to in the act is too great to warrant undertaking the work. Tillamook Bay is about 50 miles from the mouth of the Columbia River, too near for a second harbor of general interest. Furthermore, in case any improvements were undertaken at Tillamook, in the absence of a railroad, the exports from the bay would necessarily be drawn from but a limited section of country. "The Board is of opinion that it is not desirable at the present time for the United States to undertake the improvement of Tillamook bar to the extent of providing either a 15-foot or a 20-foot channel across it."

the bar, but if the agitation in behalf of the Coast Counties can in any way remove the "black eye" the Board of Engineers gave Tillamook, then this county ought to join hands with the other Coast Counties and keep up the agitation until they receive some permanent government improvements. The resources of the country warrant it, and it is time the Coast Counties were given a "square deal," which they have not had in the past.

An United Pull for the West Coast Harbors.

The west coast harbors of Oregon and all their commercial interests should be united in one strong pull for development.

The improvement of these Oregon harbors and the development of the country that is back of them, is the greatest issue before the people of this state.

Shall they be recognized and opened up and exploited and developed in the next four years, or shall they lie dormant for the next forty years?

The coast region of Oregon needs development, as the rapid and easy means of access to the interior, and the best way to develop all Oregon.

The coast region can be developed independent of the favors of the railroads. There is the richest field for the expansion of all our commercial interests.

The country tributary by water to each separate harbor is an inexhaustible gold mine for Portland and the Willamette valley is developed and made accessible.

The business interests of western Oregon should adopt a broad and consistent policy of development work commencing with a campaign for the improvement of each one of the harbors.

The people of western Oregon cannot be too aggressive in demanding the improvement of these harbors.

The millions spent by the government in making a harbor at San Pedro, Cal., a mere goose creek entering a shallow bay, has made that a great port of entry.—Capital Journal.

The revenue law requires an annual license of \$600 for every manufacturer of oleomargarine and 10 cents a pound for every pound sold. The mere coloring of oleo constitutes a manufacturer. If a boardinghouse keeper buys the pure stuff and colors it and then furnishes it to the boarders, such a person is liable for the tax as a manufacturer. The law requires the oleo to be put up in packages of not less than ten-pound weight. A license, of course, must be procured before any selling can be done, and 10 cents a pound as tax must be paid on all sales. After all the frauds are run down honest butter may have a chance to come to its own.

The House committee on banking and currency has authorized a favorable report on a bill permitting national banks to loan money on farm lands up to one-half their value, excluding improvements. This would be a radical departure from present methods and as such is strongly opposed by bankers generally. Farmers, as a class, are inclined to favor it, land being their main asset and convenient for giving as security. Bankers, however, object that it would be difficult to realize promptly on real estate loans and this might cause disastrous failures in case of runs. They prefer personally secured notes and gilt edged securities, such as bonds, for collateral, which may readily be converted into money in a pinch.

John Alexander Dowis, whose antics have filled the papers of Chicago for weeks, is a great failure as a prophet, and, if his enemies in Zion city are to be believed, he is a failure in all other respects. He seems to have bankrupted Zion and many of his followers, by his extravagance, bad business management and riotous living.
