 The Fourth of July passed off quietly in Tillamook on Wednesday, with celebrations at Cloverdale, Bay City, Nehalem and a pleasant gathering in the grounds of St. Alphonsus academy. A number of the young people from this city went to the sandspit, and in the evening a large crowd attended the dance at the opera house.

The recount will not take place until next Monday, when Attorney H. T. Goyne will act as referee in place of the circuit judge. Carl Haberlach took over the office of county treasurer when his bond was approved by the court. It is not thought by several of the judges and clerks of election that the recount will change the result of the election.
 The Fourth of July was ushered in on Wednesday morning, just at day break, with an electric storm which sent forth several loud peals of thunder, preceding which the lightning shot from the elements in rapid succession. A light shower of rain fell, and to the surprise of most everybody the day broke fine later and it turned out a most beautiful day.
 The Equal Suffrage Campaign committee will hold a meeting at the Christian church at 8 p.m. on Saturday next for the purpose of organizing an Equal Suffrage Association, electing officers and transacting any other business which may come before the meeting.  Monday was one of the hottest days ever experienced in Tillamook, for with the east wind blowing and Old Sol having an uninterrupted quiz at old Tillamook and with the temperature up to 100, for once this county had a taste of real hot weather like they have in the well, over in the Willamette valley and Eastern Oregon quite frequently. But it did not last long, for the next day the temperature was down to normal.
 There was a meeting of business men on Thursday afternoon of last week and it was decided to send Mr. F. R. Beals to Portland to see the promoters of the coast railroad, also Mr. E. E. Lytle, as there is some difference of opinion as to which railroad will tap Tillamook first. Both companies are wanting rights of way, but there is no disposition to grant this until some assurance is given that a railroad is to be built.
 It was decided at the meeting of the Tillamook Development League last night that the contest for Queen of the Carnival be confined to single young ladies, each vote to cost one cent. The young lady receiving the highest number of votes will be the Queen and the eight next highest will be maids of honor. The result of the contest will be published twice a week in the city papers and C. W. Talmage will have charge of counting the votes. It is expected that ballot boxes will be placed in most of the stores throughout the county, for young ladies in all parts of the county are invited to participate in this interesting event.
 Married, on Thursday, June 28, at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. Chas. E. Mowrey, of Portland, to Miss Hanna Josephine Nielson, the Rev. C. A. Stockwell, pastor of the M.E. church, performing the ceremony. The parlor had been tastefully arranged with flowers and evergreens and a large floral bell, and it was beneath this that the young couple were made husband and wife. Miss Marie Tierneer played the wedding march, and the happy couple having been congratulated by their friends, the guests were invited to the wedding feast. Mr. and Mrs. Mowrey will make their home in Portland.
 Another case of assault and battery occurred on Monday, in which H. F. Young, a dairyman living on the Wilson river, in a savage manner pounded L. G. Freeman in the face and kicked him in the side at the Maple Leaf factory. It appears that Young's son and other boys had been annoying Mr. Freeman, and the previous Sunday Young's son used some disgusting language to Mr. Freeman, and instead of the father chastising his own son, he undertook to lick Freeman, who, Young claimed, had said something about him when the boys were annoying Freeman. It was at the back of the factory where the assault took place. Young was standing on the platform and Freeman was standing below getting hot water, when the assault commenced, Young striking Freeman on the side of the head, several times in the face, and kicked him in the side. Freeman did not attempt to strike or injure Young. Young was arrested on Friday and pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 and costs.
 At a meeting of the city council Monday evening two ordinances were introduced and passed, first, prohibiting fire works and fire crackers in the business portion during the county fair; second, to prohibit stock running at large from the 15th to the end of August. A resolution was carried giving the use of the streets to the Tillamook Development League for the county fair. The question of cleaning up the city came in for some discussion, and Mayor Botts was instructed to issue a notice to the citizens

 Another old settler, Eli Goodspeed, passed away on Sunday morning at his home east of this city, at the age of 75 years, having resided in the county since 1876. Mr. Goodspeed was born in Genesee county, N.Y., on December 30, 1829. In 1856 he located with the family on a farm in Guthrie county, Iowa, and in 1863 crossed the plains with ox teams being four months on the journey. The first year of his residence in Oregon he located in Eastern Oregon, and in 1860 he went to Washington county, living on a farm near Forest Grove. In 1871 he located near Salem, and in 1876 he came to Tillamook. He is the father of three children, Columbus Goodspeed, living in Baker county; Emma, widow of Aaron Weller, of the same county; and County Judge H. F. Goodspeed, of Tillamook county. Mr. Goodspeed was in feeble health for several years, his eye sight causing him a great deal of trouble. On Monday afternoon the remains were buried in the Oddfellows' cemetery, the religious service being conducted by Rev. C. A. Stockwell in the M.E. church.
 Everyone was well pleased with the performance given by local talent at the opera house on Friday evening, when "Border Land," a good three act comedy drama, was played with fine effect, much to the credit of Mr. G. T. Watson, who had trained the young star actors. The play had the usual love scenes and shooting, with, perhaps, a little more of the comedy to suit the popular taste. In this particular Hon. Patrick McFadden, an Irishman and politician, and Cyrus, a colored servant, caused plenty of fun for the audience, in which Miss Spriggins, an old maid and school marm, added to the amusement, for she was dead stuck on McFadden. Mr. Lester was dignified in acting and sustained his part well as did Jack Ralston and Joe Dempsey, especially in the last act when they entered into a life or death combat with knives and in the death of the later. Mary Lester was good, so was Winona, both of whom playing their parts as though they were professional players. CLEAN UP THE CITY.
Mayor Botts Sets Next Wednesday as the Day to Use the Muck Rake.
 To the People of Tillamook City:
 The City Council has designated Wednesday, July 11th, 1906, as cleaning-up day. It is hoped that each and all of the citizens will, on that day, work together in the matter of cleaning up the rubbish and garbage upon the streets and private property of each person. A great many of the cities in the State of Oregon have been doing this work, and the results are found to be very satisfactory. With our street fair coming on, and the hundreds of visitors which we will have during the summer months, it stands in hand to have our city put on the best appearance possible, and by all working together we can take this matter up and with a little effort put the city in good condition so that it will present an attractive appearance to whoever may come here.
 In this connection I would like to call the attention of the public generally to the provisions of the city ordinance which provides that no one shall throw into the streets or alleys, or upon the side walks, any dirt, rubbish, garbage or filth, and to request that each particular citizen shall observe this provision, as it is the intention to see that the same is enforced, as money will thus be saved in the cleaning up of the streets and the health of the city will be better guarded thereby.
