Hon. E. L. Eddy, the land office official, will soon be enjoying the sobriquet of "Farmer Eddy," if he continues to grow such large crops on his fine 2 1/2 acres, on South Main street. He has "garden truck" in abundance, to say nothing of fruit, wallnut and other trees, with lots of berries of all kinds. As the News reporter was passing his fine home Mr. Eddy presented him with a mammoth head of cabbage, thinking, perhaps it was more appropriate than the bouquets of flowers which are being sent to the News office. Colonel E. Hofer, of Salem, president of the Willamette Development League, has consented to attend the county fair in this city next month and make an address, when his subject will be "A Square Deal for Oregon." The colonel is quite an enthusiast in regard to harbor improvements for the Coast Counties, and as Tillamook county has never had a square deal in harbor improvements, this is a good opportunity to show the outside world and the powers that be that it is time to open up to commerce, industry and enterprise this Coast County, which is immensely rich in undeveloped resources. Colonel Hofer is also editor of the Capital Journal at Salem and is using considerable space in the interest of the Coast Counties.

Kasper von Bergen died suddenly on Wednesday at Frank Tone's, presumably from heart failure. He left the Larson house, where he had been stopping, in the morning to work for Frank Tone. He commenced mowing soon after he arrived there until the evening. When he came in to supper he said, in broken English, and putting his hand to his heart, "It hurts; it hurts." When eating his supper he was seen to sway his body, immediately after he fell out of his chair onto the floor, dead. Dr. Smith was called, but he could do nothing for the unfortunate man. Coroner Reynolds was notified and brought the body to the city. Deceased was born in 1848 and recently came to this country from Switzerland. A peculiar incident is connected with the death of Frank Tone's hired man, for about two weeks ago another man had hired went insane and had to be taken to the asylum.

The Portland Telegram said: "at week that 'Right of way has been promised the Oregon Coast & Eastern through Tillamook County over such lands as the final locations are made, and the right of way has been secured practically the entire distance south of Humboldt Bay. This information was given out today by W. J. Wilsey, who represents the company in Portland, which is backed by the interests through the brokerage firm of Baker & Crabtree, of St. Louis, in addition to some local capital. Surveying parties are scattered along

the coast from Tillamook Bay south, and another gang is said to be along Wilson river. Colonel Wilsey says the preliminary line will be completed into Portland within six weeks and then the final locations will be made. The date when actual construction work will start depends on the surveys, but it is expected dirt will be flying by Fall. When the coast line is disposed of the field force will be shifted to Central Oregon."

#### Frank Mann Killed.

Last Saturday forenoon word reached Ferndale of an accident occurring shortly after 10 o'clock that morning that resulted in the death of Frank Mann, a young man residing with his foster father at their home up Francis Creek, a few miles from the Cream City. The young man, in company with Frank Cathey, was engaged in sliding limbs down a mountain side, the unfortunate walking on the lower side of the road. Suddenly the load turned bottomside up, pinioning the young man to the ground before a chance to escape was given him. The whole weight of the load fell across his back, breaking it, and resulting in his death a few minutes after the mishap, but not before he had called to his companion for assistance. Mr. Cathey made an effort to remove the weight from the dead man but soon called upon Os Kerri, who was working near by, and together they removed the body and assisted by L. P. Braustetter and Thomas Peterson conveyed the remains to the Mann residence. The deceased was a native of New Brunswick, where he was born 23 years ago. At the age of four years he was adopted by Richard Mann, by whom he was regarded as a son, the young man returning the affection with all a son's fidelity. He was a hard worker and industrious young man and had the friendship of all his acquaintances. Besides his benevolent father he is mourned by three sisters, Mrs. Thomas Cavanaugh and Mrs. Peter Peterson, of Port Kenyon, and Mrs. George Reas, of Newberg, and one brother, John Mann, of this section.—Ferndale (Cal.) Enterprise.

#### P. W. TODD WINS OUT.

Judges and Clerks Responsible for the Mistakes.

#### HABERLACH IS A CHEERFUL LOSER.

Every Little Erratic Voting—Only Fourteen Ballots Objected to.

The result of the contest is over, and much to the surprise of a large number of persons, it unseated Carl Haberlach and seated P. W. Todd for the office of county treasurer. At the election in June the returns gave Haberlach a majority of 7 votes, to which Todd petitioned for a recount. This came off on Monday, with Attorney T. H. Goynne acting as referee, and Attorney S. Johnson appeared for the contestant and Attorney H. T. Botts for the contestee, and which was conducted in a friendly spirit, and although luck was against him, Haberlach took his defeat cheerfully and gave up the fight with good grace.

At the recount, which did not conclude until six o'clock on Monday evening, only 14 ballots were objected to out of the entire number cast, which goes to prove that the voters of this county know how to cast their ballots intelligently. Out of these 14 ballots objected to 10 were rejected and 4 were counted, 6 of which were for Todd and 4 for Haberlach. Of those rejected 8 were rejected for the reason that the voter had written either the word "Vote" or "Voted for" on some part of the ballot, and under the decisions of the supreme court, this constituted such a distinguishing mark as to render the entire ballot illegal, and the votes were rejected for that reason. One of the other ballots had also a distinguishing mark in that the voter who had written in the name of Joe Bixby for justice of the peace, also wrote the number 81, or 811, just to the left of the name, and this was held to constitute such a distinguishing mark as to render the ballot void.

The other rejected ballots were one where the voter had drawn a line through the names of both Collier and Haberlach and had made no mark opposite the name of Todd, and another had evidently showed his intentions when he placed a pencil mark through the names of the candidates he wanted to vote for, and out of the three candidates for treasurer Haberlach's name was the one which was marked through, but it was rejected because the only legal way to vote is to place a cross or a mark between the number and the name. All other marks placed on the ballot are considered distinguishing marks, and the supreme court has ruled that the judges on the election boards should reject the entire ballot.

The ballots rejected came from the following precincts: Tillamook, 1; Fairview, 2; Beaver, 2; Hebo, 1; Hoquart, 2; Nehalem, 1; South Prairie, 1. The recount showed no gains for Haberlach in any precinct, and showed losses for him as follows: In Beaver, 2; Hebo, 1; Hoquart, 3; Nehalem, 1; Tillamook, 3; total, 10. For Todd there were gains as follows: In Beaver, 1; Carnahan, 1; Hoquart, 5; Tillamook, 1; total, 8; and he lost three votes as follows: Fairview, 1; Netarts, 1; South Prairie, making a net gain of 5. So that the vote stood at the close of the recount as follows: Haberlach, 467; Todd, 475. Below we give, in the first two columns, the official figures given for the election in June, and the two last columns as the result of the recount:

On reassembling on Tuesday morning, much to the surprise of the contestant, the contestee, seeing that Todd had a majority of 8 votes, agreed to concede the election to him, which brought the contest to an abrupt conclusion and saved Referee Goynne the trouble of passing upon others matters raised by the contestant, and Dolph precinct in parti-

cular, so the following stipulation was agreed to:

This stipulation was made between both parties that at the late general election in Tillamook County held on the 4th day of June, 1906, the contestant, P. W. Todd, received 475 votes for the office of county treasurer of Tillamook County, Ore., that the contestee, Carl Haberlach, received at said election for said office 467. It is further stipulated between the parties herein that the referee recommend that said contestant, P. W. Todd, be declared the duly elected treasurer of Tillamook county at said election. It is further stipulated that the court enter an order and decree herein declaring that said contestant, P. W. Todd, was duly elected county treasurer of Tillamook county at said election, and that the county clerk of Tillamook county be declared by said order and decree to issue a certificate of election to said P. W. Todd, declaring him in the usual form to be the duly elected county treasurer of Tillamook county and authorizing said P. W. Todd to exercise the duties and functions of said office.

In speaking of his defeat Mr. Haberlach said he wished to thank all those who had voted for and placed confidence in him at the recent election, for having conducted a clean fair campaign he has no hting to regret in making the race for county treasurer. He is satisfied all the mistakes were made in the hurry to get the votes counted and he does not attach blame to anyone, for a few errors will creep in at every election, and when the vote is close it is hard to tell which of the two candidates will win out on a recount. Haberlach is cheerful over his defeat and is not discouraged at all, for he can appeal to the electors again two years hence and will win out with a big majority, for the people like a cheerful loser. He will turn over the office and money as soon as Mr. Todd's bonds are approved, which cannot be done until the September term of court or a special term is called, for which ten days notice must be given.

In the recount, P. W. Todd also took the vote on sheriff, which increased the plurality of Henry Crenshaw over C. H. Woolfe to 29 votes.

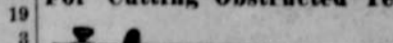
