Experimental Station on Trask.

The state fisheries department is preparing to establish an experimental station on Trask river, a tributary to Tillamook bay. Master Fish Warden Van Dusen reports having secured an excellent location. Work is to be commenced at once on the construction of the racks, and the intention is, if the results are encouraging, to start a hatchery there within the next few years. The experiment was tried on Wilson River, another tributary to Tillamook Bay, during the years 1902 and 1903, but the racks were carried away by freshets. The new racks will be in position in time to take the Fall run of chinooks and silversides.
