Barns are well filled with the big crop and farmers are well pleased with the abundance of hay they have to winter their dairy herds this winter, many of whom will carry a large quantity over, without they can otherwise dispose of it. Cheap feed is essential in dairying, and here in Tillamook cheap feed, and plenty of it, can be raised.

**The First "Gusher" in the Circuit Court.**

A suit has been filed in the circuit court by the Portland Coal and Development Company, a corporation, against A. T. Lewis, John Earl, A. Christensen and Doris Christensen, Wm. Squires, J. H. Hathaway and Anna Hathaway, John Bungarner, S. T. Childers and Grace Childers, John Theiler, Carl Prossetti, W. T. Lyster and L. M. Lyster, W. B. Powell and M. J. Powell, John Branch and A. E. **No More \$300 Exemption.**

Assessor Hare was fortunate when he assessed the county he listed the \$300 worth of property which householders have been exempt from paying taxes, consequently he will not have to go over the county again, as some of the assessors in other counties will have to do. In answer to a letter written by Assessor Hare, Attorney General Crawford says:

In reply to your favor of the 30th ult., I beg to say that the supreme court in deciding the case of Wallace vs. Fallu, on appeal from Josephine County, declared the law authorizing the householders' exemption unconstitutional and void. While I regret that such is the decision of the court, and used my best efforts to sustain the exemption by preparing a brief and presenting an oral argument at the trial of the case, I am of the opinion that it is the duty of all officers to obey the law as declared by the court, and since the court has declared that there is no valid law allowing the exemption, none should be made.

The case above cited was to enjoin the county officers for Josephine county from allowing the exemption, and the decision of the court was that the injunction be granted and no exemption allowed.
