PRESERVATIVE FOR FRUIT. Soak fruit or two weeks in a solution of: Borax, 4 oz. Water, 1 gal.

This will set color on fruit. Then to dark colored fruit add 1 to 1 gallon of liquid: 1 pt. of glycerine. 1/2 oz. of formaldehyde.

For light colored fruit add to 1 gal. of liquid: 1 pt. of glycerine. 1/2 oz. sulphurous acid.

Does Prohibition Kill a County.

TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT. As I have been sent recently I have had opportunity to observe the effect of prohibition in Morgan county, Ohio, my old home county.

It has been something over two years since the county went dry. McConnellville has paved her principal street with brick. Malta, just across the river has done the same. Many new houses have been built. People of all parties are well satisfied.

At the Fourth of July celebration there were probably 2000 present from the outside. All seemed to enjoy themselves. Several times I heard surprise expressed that there was not observed a single instance of intoxication during the day.

The officers see that the law is enforced. I was surprised to hear so little profanity on the streets. It used to be very different.

Stockport, ten miles below the county seat, on the Maskingum river, is fast

building up. Since the saloons have left the better class of people are moving to the town and it really seems a task to build houses fast enough to accommodate the people. They have just finished one of the largest flouring mills on the Muskingum and a new bank is now being erected.

People there believe that prohibition is an advantage in every way. N. COULSON.

A Dairy Trust.

It is announced from New York that a gigantic dairy trust has been formed which is to be "the biggest ever." A company, backed up by \$30,000,000 subscribed by such magnates as Levi P. Morton, Thomas F. Ryan, H. P. Whitney, Anthony Brady and other financial leaders, has secured possession of a new butter-making process, said to be far superior to any previously in use. It now operates butter plants with a capacity of 100,000 pounds a day, and is soon to erect a factory in the West which will double this production. Eggs and poultry are also to be handled by this new concern, which is evidently "out for the stuff." There is nothing small about the ambition of this most recent octopus, its intention being to absorb the 2,000,000,000 pounds of butter which the country produces annually, purify it and remanufacture it into the highest grade of butter. The closest scrutiny by the government and the public is to be facilitated, so we are informed, and every product is to be safeguarded in every possible way. The trust announces that it intends to eliminate the middleman and to pay the farmer more for his product.

All this sounds well, very well, indeed, but we shall have to await further particulars before deciding whether agriculture needs this trust to be added to the innumerable other trusts that have been for years engaged in gobbling up the great industries. As to the promise held out to farmers of higher prices for their products, we seem to have heard something of this before. Nevertheless it remains to be shown that any trust has been actuated by altruistic or philanthropic motives. They are never in business for their health or for the purpose of benefiting others. As the old circus clown used to tell the audience before beginning his song: "The proceeds are for the benefit of the widows and orphans—I am one of the orphans." Old Lord Coe quaintly observed long ago in his law book: "Corporations have no souls."

We of this day, who deal with the corporation at its best or worst, are better to appreciate the truth of this better than the old law writer, who only knew the corporation as a pigmy compared to the gigantic concerns that have been fleeing America.

We should therefore advise our friends in the dairy business to go a little slow about intrusting their goods to this latest smooth-spoken member of the Tribe Acquisitive. We have all had enough experience with them to make us cautious. The tendency is to abolish a few of the trusts we already have, rather than to allow any more to be organized. Better wait and see how the efforts of the government to clip the wings of the already overgrown gentry succeed before we extend a too cordial welcome to the Demon of the Dairy. It is all well enough to invent new processes for making butter, or any other kind of improvements to help the dairy business, but the trouble comes in when a few fellows corner these inventions and thus levy tribute on the trade by virtue of exclusive possession. In other words, it is the monopolistic feature, the grab-all idea, the elimination of honest competition, which makes the trust so objectionable. If they would be content with a reasonable share, a fair profit, no one would object. But they will not; they want it all. We see this characteristic operating in the Standard Oil, Tobacco, Packing, Twine and hundreds of other trusts, until they have become a menace not only to the legitimate business, but the very institutions and liberties of the people. In many of the States desperate efforts are being made to curb or drive out the more rapacious of these combinations, and the Federal government has its hands full right now of proceedings to protect the people from the piratical methods of various combinations. It would probably be just as well therefore to put the screws to this proposed dairy trust before it gets under way devouring everything, like an army of potato bugs. There should be stricter laws governing the incorporation of these concerns and frequent and rigid inspections of their methods after they begin operations.

The fight is on between The People vs. The Trusts, and it is a big one, a veritable new Declaration of Independence, which will not finish its course until the people are free of a much more powerful enemy than King George or any other despot that ever afflicted the human race.—American Farmer.
