Louie Loll had a complaint sworn out against him last week for violating the local option law and had a jury trial before Justice White. Virgil Donaldson was the principal witness for the state, but as he did not testify to what he had sworn to before the deputy district attorney, this deprived the state of the most important part of the evidence, so the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty against Loll. It seems that Loll obtained the liquor and offered it to Donaldson to drink, who is under age. When arrested by Constable Bewley, Loll was playing cards in the White Corner.

Word comes up from Tillamook City that the hotels down there are so full of railway surveyors that the ordinary tourist cannot get a room to save his life. As usual, they are "star" talkers; that is, one might as well question the stars as one of these gentry; no one knows where they come, who they represent, where they are going, what they are doing, nor if they have any fixed purposes. A gentleman just from there is responsible for this account of the invasion, and he is inclined to think it means something tangible in the matter of the extension of the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad from what few morsels did seep through the silence.—Astorian.

For destroying the toll gate on the Wilson road, upon information furnished by John McNamer, Deputy District Attorney W. H. Cooper indicted William Ryan, J. F. Reeber, Will Hadley, Earl Stanley, Ernest Beilitz and two others on Monday. The toll gate was torn out by these parties, who are settlers on the Wilson river road, and who claim that McNamer has no right to establish a toll gate and collect toll on the illegal contract Claude Thayer obtained from the county court when he had a "pull" with the board, consequently Mr. Thayer is taking an active part in the prosecution of these settlers who have taken the law into their own hands to protect their own rights and the rights of the county against those who have no legal rights to the road or any authority to hold people up and compel them to pay toll. Sheriff Crenshaw will make the arrests tomorrow.

### CHARGED WITH PERJURY.

#### Virgil Donaldson is in a Bad Fix for Swearing Falsely.

Virgil Donaldson has got himself into a bad scrape by swearing to one thing before Deputy District Attorney Cooper, and then swearing to another thing when on the witness stand, and which was done to shield others who were implicated in violating the local option law. He was arrested and taken before Justice White on Monday, who bound him over to the circuit court. The case grew out of one in which Louie Loll was charged with violating the local option law in giving Donaldson intoxicating liquor, swearing before the deputy district attorney "That the said Louie Loll did, on the 3rd day of August, 1906, reach down in the bottom of the buggy and get a bottle of beer, and he offered it to me first and I took a drink." Now Donaldson claims that this is not true and he swore to something else while on the stand. As Donaldson's evidence was material and upon which the state relied to convict Loll, it left the deputy district attorney in a bad fix when trying the case, which was dismissed by the jury. As this is not the first case in Tillamook where witnesses have sworn falsely on the witness stand—notably in a gambling and whiskey case in this city not long since—Deputy District Attorney Cooper has become tired of this method of defeating the ends of justice, so had Donaldson arrested on a charge of perjury, who had evidently been tampered with and advised to swear falsely by those who had sold the intoxicating liquors.
