Causes of Insomnia.

There are says Sir William Broadbent in the Practitioner, in an article on the treatment of sleeplessness, good sleepers and bad sleepers; light sleepers, disturbed by the least light or sound; heavy sleepers, who rest calmly through a thunderstorm. Some fortunate people fall asleep almost as soon as the head rests on the pillow every night; others, less fortunate, must woo sleep patiently.

The quantity of sleep also varies. The neuroathemic wakes tired after a long night's rest; the after-dinner sleep of an undue repletion is unrefreshing, and sometimes stupefying. On the other hand, a brief nap may dismiss at once the fatigue and languor of a busy man.

The greatest foe of sleep is perhaps terror; suspense and anxiety come next. Speaking generally, continues Sir William, emotional excitement relating to the future and to action is a greater cause of wakefulness than grief or regret for the past. Grief, however, often gives rise to protracted sleeplessness indirectly; it affects the digestion and then dyspepsia interferes with sleep.

When cold feet interfere with sleep, it is not merely through the feeling of cold as such, but by an influence on the general and cerebral circulation. Coldness of the feet, indeed, is often a concomitant of sleeplessness, rather than its cause.

When the feet are cold after hard brain work, the blood seems to be positively shut off from the feet. A hot bottle is then often of no use, and the best way of warming the feet with a view of procuring sleep is to stand in cold water and then rub the feet dry with a rough towel.

In a new work on food preservatives, Dr. R. C. Eccles, one of the highest authorities on ferments, as reviewed in Current Literature, says that too much, rather than too little, restrictive law is what ails us these days. Dr. Eccles points out that canned goods and bottled edibles are protected from dangerous deterioration only by the use of such

preservatives as public opinion has been led to condemn—sulphur, he said, salicylic acid, benzoic acid, formaldehyde, naphthols, hydrogen, peroxide, and the like. As to the common presumption that home-made goods survive without preservatives, he asserts that these are seldom equal in quality and flavor to those put up by the manufacturers. The cases of ptomaine poisoning so often reported are traced by these much-abused preservatives. Dr. Eccles says there is no evidence to support the frequent assertion that kidney trouble results from the elimination of the preserving acids taken with canned meats. He says that during the period of the use of canned meats have greatly increased the public health has been at its best.

The Oregon State Fair will soon be on. Those who have attended have found it a wonderful educator, so to speak, when they have gone to the Fair seeking light. The Fair is attended by crowds, and people from the farms go to the Oregon State Fair in large numbers. It would, however, be interesting to know what proportion of the farmers have never been to a State Fair. The statement would doubtless be safe which claims that one-half the farmers in each state have never been to a State Fair. They loose much by not going, as State Fairs are in a sense indications of the pulse of progress. The man who never goes to them is in danger of being unable to keep step in the forward movement of agriculture. It is not the bounden duty, therefore, of the farmer, who has a neighbor who never went to a State Fair, to try to persuade him to go if not only for once? In very many senses the words "come and see" may be significant.

Notice.

Notice is hereby given, that at the general election held in the state of Oregon, on Monday, the 4th day of June, 1906, a majority of all the votes cast at said election in Tillamook county, Oregon, duly and regularly voted against swine running at large in said county; and that at any time after sixty days from the date of this notice it shall be unlawful for swine to run at large in said Tillamook County, under penalty of five dollars for the first offense and ten dollars for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the swine by civil action in the name of the state of Oregon, before a justice of the peace of the precinct in which such owner or keeper, or either of them may reside.
