

Editorial Snap Shots.

Tillamook needs fixing—the sooner it is fixed with a railroad the better.

Boom Tillamook the next few years and make the county grow and crow.

"Ha ha!" Is the "old boy" raising another illegitimate pup? "Ha ha!"

Why not exhibit a few of the toll road advocates at the fair? They would certainly be an attraction for the numerous visitors.

The Press ought to agitate the question of getting an amendment to the constitution whereby the \$300 exemption can be made constitutional.

Oh my, that old saw mill office building is a peach. What people will think of it we don't know, but what a shack and fire trap. Wouldn't it look beautiful decorated as a monument of Tillamook City's civic pride?

Engineer Davis has a ticket that he is going to keep as a souvenir of Tillamook county, for this, the jumping off place of the Northwest, is the only place left in the known world where they can be obtained. It is a toll road ticket.

We've heard quite a number of old Tillamookers say "Why, there's nothing here for a railroad to come for." Surely they will take to the woods now that we can inform them that before long the county will have three railroads.

Taking the last ten years as a basis, we will gamble dollars to doughnuts that the farmers of Tillamook county have been more prosperous, have made more money and are in better circumstances today than farmers in any other part of Oregon, notwithstanding the fact that they are handicapped for the want of railroad facilities.

On general principles the Headlight objects to wheels of fortunes and all kinds of gambling games at the fair, and it is the duty of Mayor Botts, the city council and Sheriff Crenshaw to arrest the gamblers if they run games. It is to protect our own citizens and visitors that we call public attention to this, for a large number of persons know from experience what the gambling grafters will do once they get an opportunity to fleece the people.

For swearing falsely while making an homestead proof, Judge Hunt sentenced Coe D. Barnard to two years imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$2000. That ought to make Rollie "Honk" when he thinks of the "continuous residence" he made on his claim. But the "vandal" and the "whole gang," as Rollie called the settlers who tore out the toll gate, would like to know what he swore to about making "continuous residence" himself. That's a pretty hard nut for the "Honk!" to crack. But this is not our fight, but the "vandal" and the "whole gang," who are on the war path.

We are glad to hear that the water in Eugene is pronounced pure, and no more typhoid epidemics are liable to occur in that city, for with commendable enterprise conditions have been wonderfully improved, giving Eugene pure water, freed from all contamination by reason of its being filtered. All water ought to be filtered before using, and although the typhoid epidemic in Eugene had its bad effect and caused some fatalities and a good deal of sickness at one time, in the future, by filtering the water, Eugene will be able to prove that it has purer water than other cities which are not using filters.

The only persons who raise a rumpus in Tillamook about the assessment of their property are the timber men, and we presume they will be on hand next week with petitions yards long to convince the Board of Equalization that they are assessed too high. Assessor Hare is assessing other property at nearly its full value, and assessing timber claims at \$1,500. We do not think that the board will have much trouble to convince most people that the timber men wouldn't sell their holdings for \$10 an acre, consequently in one year's time they will be protesting again on account of another raise in the assessment, for Tillamook people are just foxes enough to know that timber is getting awfully valuable.

The Tillamook Development League would do well to invite the Oregon Press Association to Tillamook next year. It will meet next month for its annual gathering, when it is decided where the editors will meet next year. To entertain the molders of public opinion and the genuine Oregon boomers, it would mean much more to Tillamook than an expensive fair, and at very little cost. By all means invite the pencil pushers to this little Kingdom of Tillamook next year, and by giving them a royal welcome and allowing some of the older "boys" to privilege of painting the town red, we full sure the executive committee of the League will see the wisdom of inviting the Oregon Press Association to Tillamook.

The dairy operators of the Northwest will have an opportunity to witness one of the latest applications for "milking mechanically" in operation daily in connection with the Dairy exhibit during Oregon State Fair week (Sept. 10-15). This is certainly a wonderful machine, the working of which is perfect, the lac-

teal fluid being extracted gently, speedily and thoroughly, therefore removing a great amount of the drudgery in connection with this very profitable adjunct of our growing agricultural district. As the dairymen of Tillamook have become particularly interested in the milking machines, we look for a number to be installed in this county by next spring, that is if the dairymen can be satisfied they are an improvement over the hand teat machine.

Some few years ago it was said that the Headlight had given the county a "black eye" because it informed the people there was nothing but "hot air" in the railroad gossip, which also pricked a juvenile boom which had been hatched by those who had real estate to sell, and, of course, the editor was considered a bad man at the time, for the article did cause some surprise. We could not be made to boom Tillamook on railroad "hot air," for the bottom would soon have dropped out of it. Conditions are different today and the Headlight is now ready to boom Tillamook because the railroads are now assured. It is only a matter of time that it will take to construct one, two or three railroads into the county. That is all. The population of Tillamook will double itself in a few months whenever the iron horse strikes this rich section of country.

Some idea of the magnitude of the dairy industry of Tillamook County may be gained from reading the reports of its two largest cheese factories, namely, the Maple Leaf Creamery Ass'n and the Tillamook Creamery. For the month of June, 1906, the Maple Leaf factory received 579,491 lbs. of milk, containing 21,981 lbs of butter fat, and manufactured therefrom 57,483 lbs. of cheese. This cheese was sold for \$6,425.35, or approximately 11.2 cents per lb., and patrons were paid for butter \$5,569.21, or 25 1/2 cents for butter fat per lb. Number of patrons, 42. To the Tillamook Creamery factory were delivered by its 43 patrons for the same month 465,764 lbs. of milk, containing 17,612 lbs. butter fat, and there was manufactured and sold 47,822 lbs. of cheese. This cheese brought \$5,340.84, and patrons were paid at the rate of 26 3-10 cents for butter fat.

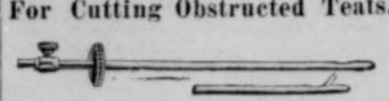


Illustration shows instrument both open for cutting and closed for inserting.
