

Dairy Dots.

The amount of feed required to make a steer will bring much more if fed to produce dairy products.

Canadian butter makers, who make a business of supplying the English market have been advised to see that their butter contains more moisture, which would make it unsuitable for the purpose of the "fakers" in England.

A ton of bran costs a lot of the farmer's untainted money. A ton of well cured alfalfa is of equal or greater value, and an acre of land on any dairy farm will produce annually from three to five tons of this alfalfa.

The London Times asserts that genuine dairy butter is a thing past paying for. Four-fifths of the population of London, the Times asserts, have never seen it in their lives. Those who know what it is have great difficulty in procuring it, and can not obtain it in many cases at any price. What is called genuine butter in London, the Times says, is blended and reworked butter.

A gallon of cream, if well skimmed either by hand or by machine, should produce from two and one half to three and one-half pounds of butter. The cream that produces more than this is too rich, and there is apt to be considerable loss in handling it. It less than three pounds of butter is made per gallon, you are handling too much milk along with your cream, which means extra labor.

The importance of the world's dairy industries is attested by the fact that they warrant the calling of international congress for discussion of the best methods of dairy conduct, the third of these having just been announced for convention at The Hague during September of next year. The general secretary of the congress is Dr. A. J. Swayning, of The Hague.

The cow is a creature of the quiet life. Her functions are not those of great muscular activity and hardships. Her mission is to change the fodders and grains of the field into the most refined article of human food. Neither her health nor her product is improved by her being required to do hard labor. Voluntary exercise contributes to her good health, involuntary subtracts from her profits.

A calf rearing test conducted by an experiment station gave the following results: In 112 days calves fed whole milk gained 1.5 pounds per head per day as compared with 1.07 pounds with those fed separator skim milk and cod liver oil. About 4 ounces was found to be the maximum amount of oil which could be fed.

The Farmer's Weeds.

Public sentiment is against the survival of the weeds, but they still have a home on the farm and thrive as though they were strengthened by the printed efforts to get rid of them. It would seem to be almost another case of persecution making stronger instead of ending.

The weeds have not a single good quality that they can really call upon to give them the right to exist on the farm. They do not lend beauty to the yards or to the roads. They are not raised for medicinal purposes and they cannot be harvested and sold. Weeds bear the same relation to a road or yard as dirt does to a house. They are out of place and should not be tolerated. They detract both from the beauty and the value of whatever spot they happen to be on. But here the relation ceases. The housewife who find dirt in the homes immediately set about to get rid of the dirt, with brooms and brushes and rags they start the battle and when the retreat is sounded the homes are neat and clean.

In case of yards, gardens and the ground by the roadsides there seems to be very little attention paid to the matter by the farmers. They seem content to let the weeds mature and develop a great crop and seed for the next season and drying spoil, the appearance of the ground completely.

In fact the weeds do not have to die to spoil the ground. The looks of the farm are decreased about one hundred per cent by the living weeds.

Out on the big prairie ranches of western Kansas and Nebraska farmers are now in such haste to get their fall plowing finished that they are running big steam plows at night with headlights on the motor engines. Thus they are able to turn over sixty acres of land in 24 hours with only two men, working in shifts. Two men working in the old way could only plow about six acres a day. During the past year 250 steam plows have been sold.
