

Editorial Snap Shots.

The Oregonian should have added another ace to its cartoon on Wednesday, for dairying in Oregon, and especially in Tillamook county, is a much bigger industry, than apples, hops and prunes.

There is this about the Hammond and Loss roads giving Tillamook City the go-by, it allows the city plenty of room to expand a mile or so to the railroads, for Tillamook City is and always will be the metropolis of the county.

When the railroad is built the dairymen won't knock their calves in the head directly they are born, as as now do by the thousands every spring. Not much. A carload of calves will mean quite an addition to a dairyman's income every year. It will be the same with hogs, for it will not be much trouble to raise a carload of hogs and for a dairyman to ship and market them himself. The same can be said of cattle and horses. And as to milk, cream and butter, a railroad will open a market for these dairy products, which is out of the question now. Farm products will receive more attention, and it would not surprise us to see large quantities of potatoes and onions and small fruits shipped from this county, for, tak-

ing potatoes and onions one year with another, there is good money in raising them. Eggs and chicken will find a good market. In fact, there are lots of things which will be grown and developed and turned into money as soon as there is a railroad. Then watch Tillamook grow—and crowd.

JOURNEYED FROM HOOD FARM.

Jersey Bull Calf Comes All the Way from Lowell, Mass., to Oregon.

Mr. J. F. Martin, of Tillamook, has just received a Jersey bull calf that has travelled by express all the way from Hood Farm, Lowell, Mass., to Oregon. That the animal is a valuable one may be inferred from the facts that Hood Farm is the most famous breeding establishment in the world, that the bull is a grandson of the grand champion cow at the World's Fair, St. Louis, and that he was insured for the express company for a larger sum than any other bull ever sent out from Hood Farm.

The sire of this calf is Hood Farm Poggis 9th, the son of Grand Champion Figgis and probably the most valuable bull in the world. His dam is Tonona 29th of Hood Farm, a young cow that gave in a yearly authenticated test with her first calf 6,762 lbs. milk that tested 395 lbs. 3 oz. butter. She is a daughter of the great Sophie's Tormentor bull, Toronto, that is the sire of many great cows, including Tonona 9th of Hood Farm, the champion yearly authenticated test heifer of the breed.

It is to be regretted that there are so many young men who have never come to their senses who are contented with annoying the public instead of being a man amongst men, always taking the part of a clown or donkey in every gathering, or destroying property at night. The law never completed a man, men generally go from bad to worse before the law, self intention is the only safe guard. This obstruction may be a stricture or other growth of a tumorous nature, which is often the result of the bite of a dog, a kick or a bruise caused by going over a fence or through a dense underbrush; or the cow may have had some trouble with that quarter of her bag, and in milking and forcing the thickly curdled milk out, a small rupture had resulted, so that when the scab tissue formed, the opening became smaller.
