Science and Industry.
Cadmium gives protective coatings
for iron much superior to zinc. The coat
has the same aspect as zinc, but is much
more adhesive and harder.
If metallic iron is melted along with
copper or brass, it is said that part of
the alloy and becomes chemically
combined, and the remainder separates
in pellets or nodules of the hardness of
steel. These nodules are the source of
much trouble in brass, as they injure
tools to an alarming extent.

According to the Ironmonger, news
has been received in Winnipeg of the dis-
covery of large deposits of paint-earth
on the shores of Hotkinton lake, near
Vonda, Saskatchewan. The colors are
yellow, vermilion and slate, and supply
is stated to be inexhaustible. Settlers
are using it to paint buildings in the
vicinity.
An interesting instance of albinism
in birds is reported from Verviers, Bel-
gium. The case is that of a swallow. A
pair of birds had their nest against a
house near the village church of Steint-
ber, and five nestlings were hatched.
Great surprise was experienced as the
young birds became fledged, when one
of them—a hen—was found to be entire-
ly white, with red eyes. The incident is
scientifically explained as due to the
absence of the usual coloring pigment.

The aquatic plants of a pond have
an important influence upon the fishes in
the water. The investigation of R. H.
Pearl, the American botanist, prove that
most rooted water plants extract miner-
al food from the ground, and such vegeta-
tion as the pondweed (dotomogeton)
adds fishes by adding mineral substance
to the water. On the other hand, the
hornwort (ceratophyllum) unites a base
for fish life, as it takes its own food
from the salts in the water.
There are a number of plants and
flowers that give out a phosphorescent
light in the dark. Linnaeus first noticed
this phenomena in the common nastur-
tium, whose flowers seemed to him to
have a faint iridescence at night. Later
observations by others showed that the
light was stronger after very sunny
days.

Among other plants that possess this
singular property are the marsh lily and
the fraxinella. The last-named secretes
a volatile oil, oozes out during hot
weather, spreads in a thin layer over
the flowers and forms a vapor that be-
comes luminous in the darkness. In the
coal mines near Dresden grows a species
of fungus that "exhibits the appearance
of luminous festoons of shifting colors."
Having a cargo of oil on board saved
serious trouble to the steamer Paraguay
while bound from Port Arthur to Phila-
delphia. She left Sabine Pass on Sep-
tember 10 for Marcus Hook with a car-
go of Texas oil. On the third day of
the wind increased to a gale, which
steadily gained in violence, with a heavy
sea, and for safety the vessel was
hoisted to.

On Monday, Sept. 17, the storm in-
creased to a hurricane, causing heavy
seas to break over the vessel. Water
tanks were carried away and ventilators
smashed. In the midst of the storm the
steering gear broke, causing the vessel
to roll over on her beam ends. It was
then decided to dump part of the cargo
overboard, which was done, and it had
the immediate effect of calming the sea.
No seas broke over the vessel after using
the oil, and she rode out of the storm
easily, and in a short time was able to
continue on her course.
