Fleck et al defendants, is a suit filed in the circuit court, in which plaintiff asks the court to decree that certain conveyances and leases made to defendants are fraudulent and that the same be set aside and cancelled, and the sale and execution be set aside and held for naught. Botts in the construction of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co.'s railroad in Tillamook county had to be postponed until Saturday afternoon. Had the weather been fine a large crowd would have been present, but it is hoped that the weather will be agreeable on Saturday, for breaking the first sod for a railroad that is to give this county railroad connections is an event of much importance to Tillamook, and for that reason, no doubt, a large crowd will be present on Saturday. It will be east of town, on Goodspeed's place, which will become the terminal of the road.

The equipment for starting work on the railroad arrived in this city from Hillsboro on Tuesday. The Pacific States Telephone Company has bought out the Tillamook Telephone and Telegraph Company, or what is commonly known as the Tuttle system, and will take possession on the first of the month. Mr. Thatcher is here and it is proposed to put in a good system in the south part of the county and make connections by way of Sheridan instead of across the mountains. Rev. A. K. Baird, D.D., and Mrs. Baird came in on Sunday afternoon, having been detained at Sheridan one day, and on that account Mr. Baird was not able to fill the pulpit in the Presbyterian church, as announced in our last issue. He will do so Sunday evening, preaching at Bay City in the morning. A cordial invitation is extended to the people of Tillamook to meet Dr. Baird. Mrs. Fannie M. Bain has filed divorce proceedings against her husband, Alexander T. Bain, in the circuit court, her attorneys being Talmage & Johnson. These parties were married in Tillamook county in April, 1890, and three children are living of the union. The grounds for the divorce, as set out in the complaint, are desertion of his wife, which took place a year ago, and in neglecting to provide for her and two of the minor children. A suit was filed on Monday in the circuit court by Tillamook County vs. the Wilson River Road Company, a corporation. Plaintiff prays for a judgment to cancel and annul the pretended agreement or lease the county gave to the road company, and to forfeit the same. Plaintiff also asks for costs and disbursements. This is another suit growing out of the famous 50 year lease which County Judge Sappington and Commissioners Roy and Parrish granted the road company, when they were running county affairs, the court not even calling for bids nor did it give notice that it was going to lease the road. There is an appeal pending to a ruling of Judge Burnett in the supreme court, and besides the new case filed on Monday, two other cases will come up at the next term of the circuit court, viz. that of the arrest of William Ryan, J. F. Recher, Will Hadley, Earl Stanley and E. Beelitz who are charged with destroying the toll gate, and that of the injunction suit in which J. F. Recher has enjoined the road company and Wesley Rush from collecting toll. After all these cases have been disposed of it is said that damage suits will follow, and all this lawing on account of the county officials unlawfully bartering away the people's rights.
