No Opinion in Writing. Judge Burnett wrote no opinion in the case, but from the issues it is apparent that he must have decided the following points: That the local option law is constitutional; that the local option is a criminal law, since it defines an offense which is punishable by indictment and fine; that the people of a city cannot therefore adopt a charter which will suspend the operation of the local option law.

Commissioner Bailey, in talking of his forthcoming report, said: "I am of the opinion that Oregon is to become one of the greatest dairying states in the Union.
