Tillamook county ought to have three terms of court a year, for in these days of progress circuit court every six months is altogether too long between acts and is not fair to litigants. It is to be hoped that Representative Beals will have a bill prepared to that effect and get it through the next state legislature. This is a matter the bar association ought to agitate also.

Owing to the steamer being detained at Astoria on account of bad weather, only part of the plates of the pictures taken at the turning of the sod for the railroad have reached us. These pictures were taken specially for our last issue, but the plates being sent by express they failed to make connection. Tillamook City the next few years ought to increase in population to 5000. That, however, depends upon whether the city is run in the interest of grafters and gamblers, or in the interest of those who want to trade here. It will soon be up to the business men and property owners whether Tillamook City will remain the metropolis and principal trading point of the county, or whether some other city will spring up and put this city in the shade. It is a survival of the fittest, anyway, and the city that will build up industries and not gamblers to build up the town is sure to come out on top.

The American Farmer says: "An advertisement for a girl to work on a New Zealand dairy farm concludes with the statement that there are four good looking sons in the family. Who can doubt that this bait will secure many a bite or that hundreds of replies will be sent in to that advertisement? Most girls dislike dairy work, but who can resist membership in a family where she is sure to be waited on, attended to and courted by four fine fellows in rivalry. Of course it won't be long until the new girl will own a fourth interest in the dairy as well as the rest of the farm." The Farmer has figured it all out very nicely, but what would the girl do should it turn out that the "four good-looking sons" were crying baby boys?

The amount of business in the county clerk's office has increased to such an extent the past two years that the fees of the office pays the salaries of the clerk and the deputy clerk, and had not the last state legislature reduced the filing fees, the county clerk's office would have yielded several hundred dollars over and above the salaries of the two officials. From a statement prepared for the county court, we find that for the year ending Nov. 1, 1905, 764 instruments had been recorded; and for the same period this year, 1,325 had been recorded, or nearly double the amount of business. Nearly \$2,300 was collected in fees by the county clerk for the twelve months ending the 1st Nov., 1906, which is conclusive proof that those who have business in the clerk's office are paying the salaries of the clerk and deputy, and not the taxpayers. However, the office is being run economically for the large and increasing amount of business, which is something of interest and satisfaction to the taxpayers, for it is admitted that Geo. B. Lamb has made an exceptionally good county clerk.

There appears to be some difficulty in securing the rights of way for the railroad, or, to be more correct, there does not appear to be the same willingness on the part of the settlers to be reasonable. But it is time for the settlers, over whose land the survey is run, to be as reasonable as possible and come to an immediate understanding with the executive committee. With comparatively little cost Tillamook is getting a railroad, which will be a benefit and everybody ought to put their shoulder and keep their shoulder to the wheel, and if there are any disgruntled knuckers in the field, purposely sent out to knock and retard the progress of the Lytle road, the searchlight ought to be turned upon their tactics. Having started in with Mr. Lytle and guaranteed him a right of way, there is only one thing to do and that is to stay with it, and whenever a knocker stabs up go for him. It is our candid opinion that the executive committee, who has the matter of rights of way in hand, will be just and reasonable, and to avoid condemnation proceedings, it looks to us, when all the costs are considered, it will be better for those who are interested to come to an understanding with the committee than to take their cases into court, for it is hard to tell what damages the appraisers would award.
