**The City Election.**

The city election on Monday did not create any excitement, and for the first time in many years not one candidate announced himself in opposition to the caucus nominees, all of whom were elected, which is something remarkable for Tillamook City. There was no nominee for city marshal, but in a scattering vote E. Huntsinger received the unlucky number of 13 votes, which, should he qualify, will make him the man with the "big stick" about town and a terror to the law breakers if he has the "sand" and grit to do his sworn duty. As the citizens voted down the amendment to the city charter to provide for a 5 mill tax levy, by a majority of 18, the city will have to worry along the best it can, for a big proportion of the taxes raised in the city goes into the coffers of the Tillamook Water Commission to keep it head above water and to prevent it from going into the bankruptcy court.
