Say, boys, there's a lot of pretty school marm's in town. Where's John?

The Special Dairy Course at the Oregon Agricultural College will take place on Jan. 8, and continue until Feb. 15. This is a course every young man who intends to engage in the dairy business ought to avail himself of. The course is designed to familiarize students with the modern forms of dairy apparatus, and teach the underlying principles of the production, care, and manufacture of milk into butter and cheese. Both the how and the why will be the aim of the instructors, and it is the intention that the ideas set forth will be applicable to the farm dairy as well as the larger creamery or cheese factory.

An item of news which may be of interest to some persons in Tillamook was handed us for publication, which took place at Ferndale, Cal., last September. Richard Perry, 19 years old, shot and probably fatally wounded his step-father whose name is Cavanaugh, at their home at Ferndale. Perry fired five shots with a revolver, three of which took effect. Cavanaugh, who is a tenmer, has been in the habit, when intoxicated, of beating his wife and children. Last night he came home in that condition and threw the baby toward the ceiling. When his wife interceded he attempted to strike her, and when her son defended her, slashed the young man's arm with a razor. Perry secured a revolver and fired over Cavanaugh's head to frighten him, but when Cavanaugh continued his attack shot him twice in the breast and once in the arm. There is little hope of Cavanaugh's recovery. Richard Perry is a step grandson of Richard Mann, who lived here some few years ago, as did also Cavanaugh, who worked at the saw mill and did some draying.

Mr. Stephen Tillotson, died at his home east of this city early on Wednesday morning. The previous evening he was apparently in his usual good health, when his wife went to bed, and as he failed to come to bed later she became alarmed, and finding he was not in the house, went outside, and near the wood shed found her husband unconscious and bleeding from the nose. Having obtained assistance he was taken to the house, where he died early next morning, having never regained consciousness. The cause of death was the breaking of a blood vessel in the lungs. The deceased was born at Harford, Tompkins county, New York, on the 15th September, 1826, being 80 years of age. He was the third child of a family of ten children, six boys and four girls, of whom but two survive him, Jerome Tillotson, of New York state, and Mrs. Maranda Martin, of Salem, Ore. He leaves a wife and daughter, Mrs. Mary N. Williams, of Tillamook, and one son, J. W. Tillotson, of Oakland, Cal. He came to Oregon in June, 1867, locating in Polk County, and came to Tillamook in 1870. He spent eight years in Marion county and six years in Florida. The remains were buried today (Thursday), the funeral service being in the M. E. church, conducted by Rev. D. L. Shrode, the pastor, and the burial in the A.O.O.F. cemetery. The deceased was a man who was highly respected.

TEACHERS' GATHERED FOR ANNUAL SESSION.

Great Enthusiasm Shown—Discussions Point to Most Successful Meeting—An Interesting Program.

The Tillamook County Teachers' Institute met yesterday at nine o'clock in the Circuit Court room of the new Court-house with 60 teachers present. After organization, section work was at once taken up, the primary division holding its session in the court-room and the advanced division meeting in the jury-room adjoining.

Yesterday's Session.

In the advanced division Mr. Traver gave a very interesting talk on language. He said: "During the last three years emphasis should be placed on composition. The essentials of composition work are:

- 1.—Subject matter.
 - 2.—Outline.
 - 3.—Research for knowledge.
 - 4.—Sentence structure, which forms the basis of all language work.
 - 5.—Correction.
 - 6.—Time and method.
- Things to talk about in Oregon are:
- 1.—Wheat raising, plowing, etc. Why?
 - 2.—Horticulture.
 - 3.—Fruit raising, spraying, budding, grafting, etc. How and why?
 - 4.—Dairying.
 - 5.—Stock raising.

In the primary division Mr. Rice in discussing the subject of members, said, in introducing qualification similar methods are used in previous work, something definite being required at each step. First give a problem, have the pupils perform the movements with objects their counters, add at first. Then lead them to see the shorter forms, always compel the child to perform the movement before seeing or writing the written form, returning to the objects, if any difficulty is met, compel the use of counters until operations are perfectly familiar, then imagine the use to prepare for abstract work.

Last evening the visiting teachers were entertained at a reception given by the teachers and pupils of the Tillamook High School. The evening was thoroughly enjoyed by all. The Tillamook orchestra rendered several selections that were enthusiastically received. Misses McNair and Alderman of the senior class each sang solos. Prof. Rutherford made an address of welcome and extended the hospitality of the city and of the High School to the teachers. Refreshments were served by the High School girls.

Two splendid features of this morning's session were the talks given by Mr. Rutherford in the advanced division, the those given in the general session by Mr. Alderman, of Yamhill County. Mr. Rutherford's talk was concerning school libraries and their proper use, and Mr. Alderman's address was on the school and home.

Sessions will continue until Saturday afternoon. This evening Mr. Traver is to give a lecture at the Court House, his subject being "Boys or Bricks."
