

Editorial Snap Shots.

GREAT INTEREST AROUSED Big Attendance at School Officers' Meeting at Beaver.

The little town of Beaver was crowded to overflowing last Saturday, when the School Officers' Convention was held as arranged by County Supt. Wiley. In spite of the adverse weather conditions prevailing, people drove for miles from all directions to attend the meeting. The forenoon session was held in the Beaver schoolhouse, but owing to the large attendance the afternoon session was held in the United Brethren Church.

At noon, a big dinner was served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Dunstan. For one and one-half hours, the people took complete possession of the house. Two big tables were weighted down with the best that Nestucca affords, and as rapidly as these tables were vacated, many others were ready to take possession.

In the afternoon session, Mr. H. A. Kinnaman, Chairman of District No. 26, presided, and Miss Mattie Cavitt, teacher of District No. 50, was the orator.

School Apparatus and Equipment.

This subject was very fully discussed by Supt. Wiley, Prof. Rutherford, F. C. Borneman and others. The first speaker recommended that each district expend some definite amount for needed apparatus each year. There is no district, however poor, but what is able to expend at least ten dollars for this purpose, and most of our districts are able to expend a much larger sum. Every schoolroom should be supplied with the following indispensable furniture; Upright stove, protected by steel jacket equipped with a proper ventilating shaft; sectional library cases, with glass doors; two recitation seats equipped with extension arms; one teacher's desk; revolving chair; two other chairs for use of visitors; large work table for use of pupils; good reliable wall clock; nest woodbox in corner of schoolroom; porcelain water sink, with pump and waste pipe; mirror; window curtains adjusted from bottom of window; water buckets; basins; brooms; mops; sprinker; eraser cleaner, pencil sharpener, good ax, individual towels and drinking cups; waste paper basket; ash bucket; shovel; etc.

Other necessary apparatus needed includes such good blackboard space, slate or hyloplate especially recommended; a green board is preferable to a blackboard; one international dictionary and holder; good globe; set of eight or more good wall maps, one of the state; one good school organ or piano; good reading and reference library; ten or more copies of Webster's Common School Dictionary; and if the district can afford the same, a standard encyclopedia. Each district should furnish their schools with all necessary crayon, ink, pencils, etc. The use of slates should not be permitted, but paper tablets were recommended instead.

The School Directors.

This was the subject of a splendid discussion led by Mr. C. J. Blanchard, and further discussed by A. M. Ginn and others. The speakers urged the patrons to co-operate with the directors, all working together for the interest of the boys and girls. The school board should employ good teachers and then give proper support to the teachers employed.

The Consolidation of Schools.

This subject was discussed with great enthusiasm by the County Supt., Mr. W. D. Gladwell, Mr. R. Y. Blalock, Mrs. E. M. Johnson, and a number of others. The County Supt. presented a very feasible plan showing that Districts Nos. 32, 45 and 50 should take advantage of the School Consolidation Law and unite, thus forming one large district in which nine or more months of school could be held, and a good graded school maintained. A map was displayed showing that, if the districts were consolidated, the school building could be located at the Boulder Creek Bridge and would thus accommodate all of the pupils of the school held in the three districts for the last six years to be but 4 1/2 months. By consolidation, this could easily be increased to nine months. This plan will be discussed further in the future, and will then be submitted to a vote of the three districts concerned at the annual meeting next June.

Declamatory Contest.

A declamatory contest was held in connection with the regular program in which twelve representative from all the schools in the vicinity participated. The Judges, Mr. W. R. Rutherford, Mr. Albert Mason, Mr. F. E. Borneman, awarded first prize to Miss Mary Coulson, of District No. 51. Second and third prizes were awarded to Miss Stella Saling, of District No. 8, and Miss Cecil Kinnaman, of District No. 26, respectively.

Association Formed.

Before final adjournment, an association was organized to be known as "The Beaver School Officers' Association." Meetings will be held in the future at stated intervals.
