**WILL SAVE \$25,000.**

**Bill Introduced to Ascertain Amount of Timber on Every Quarter Section.**

Representative Beals has introduced a bill in the state legislature which is of considerable importance to Tillamook county. It is the aim of Mr. Beals to ascertain the amount of timber on every quarter section, and by doing so he has estimated that if the bill becomes a law it will save Tillamook county alone some \$25,000 the first year. The bill provides that the owners of any forest or timber land shall have the land cruised and the report as made given to the assessor. The land is then to be assessed with this valuation as a basis. In the event of false report of value being made or failure to furnish the report called for, the owner is to be fined \$25 for every quarter section owned by him.

We give below the bill:  
 For an act to amend section 3070 of the Code and Statutes of Oregon compiled and annotated by Charles B. Bellinger and William W. Cotton, and to require all persons and the managing agent or officer of any corporation or association liable to be assessed to furnish the county assessor with a list of property liable to taxation and prescribing a penalty for failure to do so.

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Oregon:

SEC. 1. That section 3070 of the Codes and Statutes of Oregon compiled and annotated by Charles B. Bellinger and William W. Cotton, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

SEC. 3070. Every Assessor shall require and person liable to be taxed in his county and to be assessed by him, and the managing agent or officer of any corporation or association liable to be taxed in his county and to be assessed by him, to furnish such assessor a list of all the real estate situated in his county liable to taxation, and a list of all the personal property of such person, corporation, or association liable to taxation in this state, and shall require such person, managing agent, or officer to make oath that, to the best of his knowledge and belief, such list contains a true and full account of all its, or his property liable to be taxed in such county; every such list of real estate which shall include timber lands shall, in addition to the description of such lands include a statement or schedule verified, as herein-before provided, showing the kinds and character of timber standing on each legal subdivision thereof, and the amount of each kind thereof, if such information shall be within the personal knowledge of the person liable to be taxed therefor, or of the managing agent or officer of any such corporation or association; and if such person, agent or officer shall not have the requisite personal knowledge, then such list shall be accompanied by a copy of a timber cruiser's estimate of such standing timber, together with date of such estimate, and the name of the person or person by whom made, which copy shall be certified under oath by the person so furnishing the same, to be a true copy of such cruiser's estimate, and such estimate so to be furnished shall be the latest estimate that shall have been made of such timber:

SEC. 2. And if any person shall refuse to furnish such list or to swear to the same when required so to do by the Assessor, such person shall forfeit and pay to the Assessor for the use of the county the sum of fifty dollars; and if any person, corporation or association shall refuse to furnish such statement or schedule of standing timber or any such verified copy of cruiser's estimate when required so to do by the assessor, such person, corporation or association shall forfeit and pay to the assessor for the use of the county in addition to the forfeiture herebefore provided the sum of twenty-five dollars for each quarter section or fraction thereof of such timbered land for which person, corporation or association shall be liable to be taxed, and any such sum or sums may be recovered by action in any Court having jurisdiction thereof, and it shall be the duty of the District Attorney to prosecute the collection of any such forfeiture when requested so to do by the assessor, and all sums forfeited under this act, shall be considered and are hereby declared to be a debt due from the person, association, or corporation liable therefore to the county wherein the property is liable to assessment and shall be a lien against such property.

Should any such person, managing agent or officer, when so required, refuse to furnish and to swear to such list

or statement or copy of cruiser's estimate the assessor shall ascertain the taxable property of such person, corporation, or association, and shall appraise the same from the best information to be derived from other sources.

SEC. 3. The County Board of Equalization of any County shall have the authority and is hereby empowered to compel the attendance of any person or persons before said Board as a witness to testify concerning any matters connected with the assessment or equalization of the assessment of any property subject to assessment and taxation within the county and the said county clerk of the county shall, when requested by the Board of Equalization, issue subpoena for such witness or witnesses and the same shall be served by the sheriff of said county. Any witness so subpoenaed shall be entitled to and receive the same fees and mileage which he would be entitled to receive in an action at law between private individuals, and the same shall be audited and paid by the county in the same manner as fees are paid witnesses in criminal cases.

**Women.**

TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT.  
 "Ye cannot serve God and mammon."  
 There are two kinds of women, one the home woman, the other the commercial woman.

It is to the home woman we must look for our future race, yet she is absolutely helpless, for from the time she undertakes the responsibility of a home to the end of her life, she must look to some one else for support, she cannot look after the welfare of the home and provide for its maintenance. The commercial woman is the exterminator of the home. She is self-reliant, she is not obliged to God or man. She may keep house, but she is a blank in the sense of a home.

To a child, home is where mother is, and is dependent upon its mother for a home, as a woman is dependent upon God and honest men for the support of a home.

It is a great mistake to educate a girl for a commercial life and then expect her to be contented with a home life, without any preparation to make home life easy one must know to take advantage of the work and to know how to make it interesting.

I have met men who had a home woman, with a house full of children, that lived nicely on \$30 a month income, and I have seen men who had a commercially raised woman that went out and earned more than \$20 a month. While the man earned over \$50 a month himself, with only one or two children, nearly grown, that could not make the year's ends meet.

The home woman enjoys the consolation of serving God. While the commercial woman never comes to rest serving mammon.

A man has a commercial position at \$100 a month. He marries a home woman and has a natural family. Mean while a girl is taking a commercial course. When she is qualified she takes the position which the man held. The home loses its support. The commercial woman is always fearful of her husband dies, while she is a greater menace to the home than death and when men are men to men, the commercial woman will not be allowed to compete with the home. The home requires as much intelligence as commerce, only it is in a different way.

The home woman leads a humble life and has the most sacred responsibility. She fights the greatest battles and accomplishes the greatest deeds by raising sons that is to her credit. The commercial woman is incompatible to the home. Whether she sells her virtue for a paltry sum, or whether she serves the place of men, for in one she allures men from the home life, and in the other she deprives the home of its support.

The public school was well intended to qualify a girl for a home life, by teaching her how to read and cipher, but commercialism is only fit for men, and it is decidedly wrong to employ a woman at the expense of the hallowed home that every man should enjoy, which is never complete without a home woman.
