Editorial Snap Shots.

Does the Oretown Grange mean the blackmail letter graft?

The next few months the Headlight will contain a good deal of interesting matter, with pictures, about Tillamook county. We are doing this to advertise the county and so as to have literary matter to send to those who are inquiring about the county.

There is no section of Oregon that has a brighter outlook to become a large manufacturing center than Tillamook County now that the transportation question is solved by the building of two railroads. Then see former Tillamookers return in car loads.

We believe it. Rollie Watson, Oak Nolan and "Bell-Wether" Bill could not be making bigger fools of themselves if they tried. The very name of "Baker" has such an effect upon them that they act and write like a lot of monomaniacs.

As we said last week, please do not laugh at their ravings, but consider the source and reputation of this trio of mud slingers.

We would have liked to have given the editor of our contemporary some fraternal and friendly advice, seeing that he is having the time of his life apologizing for what he published the previous week, besmirching the characters of honorable citizens, for we do not like to see a newspaper man imposed upon in that way. Certainly he is having a strenuous time. But we did not do so, for fear it might have the same effect as waiving a red flag in the face of a mad bull. The trio have, we consider, got themselves into a bad muss.

Before the snap shot man got his Tillamook wind, over eight years ago, R. M. Watson boasted that it wouldn't be long before they ran Baker out of the county, and from that time until the present others have taken a hand, but made a miserable failure of it. Whether the snap shot man grit his teeth and held on with a bit of tenacity, or whether the public grit its teeth and held on to the snap shot man, this is something we will leave for the public to decide.

We sincerely trust that Rollie Watson, Oak Nolan and Bill Smith and the disgruntled democratic knockers will keep up their present racket. The public is next.

Some years ago Mr. Davies, who then owned the property west of the school house, wanted the city to pay him \$25 for part of the street opposite the property, as it never had been dedicated as a street. The city council at the time pook-pooked at the proposition and did nothing to satisfy Mr. Davies claim. On Monday evening B. J. Stephens, who now owns the property, asked the city council for damages. The committee on streets and public property recommended paying him \$35, but as Mr. Stephens would not accept that, no action was taken by the city council. No wonder that the bonus men don't like the County Bank, but it is plain to most every body that they drove people to that bank to do business. One object of the defunct Independent was to besmirch the character of M. W. Harrison and injure the reputation of the County Bank, but it only acted as a boomerang. Now Rollie

is taking up the same fight, with the bonus men, whiskey ring and the usual disgruntled democratic knockers backing him. Mr. Harrison's twenty five years' residence in the county has given the people a pretty good idea of his honesty and integrity, and although men like Rollie Watson, Oak Nolan and W. B. Smith may keep raving, the public saw there was a sinister motive behind those who backed the Independent with their money, and the public see now that it is the same ring that is using Rollie. We wish to point out present conditions: The Independent is dead, the Bank of C. & E. Thayer is ready to give up the ghost and the County Bank and Mr. Harrison have therespect and confidence of the people of the county.
