THREE FACTORIES WITH 8,451,248 lbs. MILK.

Manufactured 880,087 Pounds of Cheese and Receives \$104,428.42.

Another interesting creamery report, that of The Tillamook Creamery, was submitted to the stockholders and patrons by their enterprising secretary, Mr. Carl Haberlach.

We give below Mr. Haberlach's report in full:

To the Directors and Stockholders of The Tillamook Creamery, Tillamook, Oregon.

Overseers—I herewith submit the following as may report as Secretary of The Tillamook Creamery for the last year.

Total amount of milk delivered to the factory 3,194,606 lbs., divided into months as follows: January, 40,762 lbs.; February, 53,142 lbs.; March, 148,946 lbs.; April, 314,329 lbs.; May, 488,792 lbs.; June, 465,764 lbs.; July, 479,457 lbs.; August, 588,931 lbs.; September, 310,695 lbs.; October, 285,102 lbs.; November, 149,119 lbs.; and December, 72,667 lbs.

Total amount of butter fat in milk was 126,377.16 lbs. Average test for the season was .03956.

Total amount of cheese manufactured and sold was 880,087 lbs. Average yield per 100 lbs. milk, 10.34 lbs. Average received for cheese, 11.92 cents per lb. No. boxes cheese sold, 5,434.

Total amount received for cheese, \$39,390.10. Amount paid patrons, \$34,390.00.

Amount of milk require for pound of cheese, 9.68 lbs. Average amount of cheese per lb. butter fat 2.61.

Patrons were paid for butter fat as follows: January, 29.2 cents; February, 31 cents; March, 33 1/2 cents; April, 30 cents; May, 23 1/2 cents; June, 26.3 cents; July, 26.6 cents; August, 26.7 cent; September, 27.4 cents; October, 28 cents; November, 28.4 cent; and estimated for December, 28 cents.

The factory charged 1 1/2 cents for making for each month, excepting October, when 1 1/2 cents was charged. The yield in the month of December was 12 lbs. per 100, for which factory received \$1.7844, but owing to the average test being over 3.13 for the factory the butter fat price will be correspondingly lower.

The patrons will receive \$1.44 per 100 lbs. milk for that month. Average paid patrons for milk for the season, \$1.08.

Assets and liabilities of the corporation are as follows:

Resources: Factory building complete, \$2,500.00. Supplies on hand at first of the year, \$236.42; due from merchants for cheese, \$1,137.85. Money to credit of factory in bank, \$308.31. Fifteen shares of stock of The Tillamook Creamery, par value, \$375.00. Total resources, \$4,577.58.

Liabilities: Note due C. & R. Thayer for \$250.00; due patrons for December milk, \$1,047.54. Net resources, \$3,280.04.

Amount received by factory for making cheese, being 1 1/2 cents for each month excepting October, when 1 1/2 cents was charged for making, \$5,032.78.

Expenses for the year, less amount supplies on hand January 1st, 1907, and amount stock of supplies sold, \$4,360.41. Total amount supplies sold and stock on hand being, \$626.63. Total disbursements, \$4,987.06. Total receipts from making and stock sold and held over, \$5,532.41. Amount of receipts over expenditures were \$672.35.

The amount of milk delivered at the factory last year was the largest by far ever received by it, and is a good indication of the growth of the dairy industry of the community and the county. Prospects for this coming season are very good.

While the yield per 100 lbs. of milk (10.34 lbs. of cheese) was probably as good or a little above the average in the county, yet in the latter part of the season the factory put up a very firm cheese, which lowered the yield for the season considerable. I think it would be well if the make cheese that would be a little less firm and yet not too soft.

The soft cheese is liable to get sour and rancid when put in storage for too long a time. There has also been a great demand for a smaller size cheese, namely, a cheese weighing about twenty lbs. While we made some of these cheese last year, we did not begin making them early enough, as they were mostly in demand in the early part of the season. This is the cheese usually called the "split cheese."

NEW TIMBER LAW BEFORE SENATE.

Committee Recommends Sale of Timber and Retention of the Land.

Washington, Feb. 6.—The Senate committee on public lands today favorably reported a bill repealing the timber and stone act and providing that in the future the Government shall retain title to its timber lands and sell only the timber at not less than its appraised value.

Counties get Fourth of Value

Mr. Fulton served notice on the committee some time ago that he would oppose the repeal of the timber and stone act unless one-fourth of the receipts from timber sales should be paid to the counties for school and road purposes, and it was in compliance with this demand that the bill was so amended.

The counties will not only receive 25 per cent of the receipts from timber sales on unreserved timberland, but from sales within forest reserves as well. This concession to the counties is made to reimburse them for taxes which they might ultimately collect should this timberland pass into private ownership.

Under the amended bill title to all timberland remains in the government, hence the land itself cannot be taxed. This amendment, however, does not exempt lumber companies and other purchasers of timber from payment of taxes on their product.

Sell Timber to Highest Bidder. As the bill now stands the Secretary of Agriculture will appraise government timber and sell it at public auction or private sale to the highest bidder for not less than the appraised value, preference being given to bidders for small quantities for use in the immediate vicinity of the land.

Persons actually residing near timberland shall be entitled to take free of charge not exceeding 100,000 feet board measure in any one year for individual use, but not for sale.

The bulk of the money derived from timber sales after deducting 25 per cent for the counties, will go into the reclamation fund, the residue going into the forest reserve fund to defray the expenses of forest management and control.

It is provided that timberland reserved from entry for timber shall be subject to location and entry under mining or coal land laws, and that land chiefly valuable for building or commercial stone shall be entered under the placer mining laws.
