

Need of Organization.

TO THE EDITOR TILLAMOOK HEADLIGHT. At present time, where different business methods and labor saving inventions have altogether changed the conditions and surroundings in our industrial fields, where the small manufacturer—the once independent workman—is fast crowded out, and forced to make a dependent cog in the wheel of an industrial unit, organized on a gigantic scale, and capitalized by the hundreds of millions of dollars, such as the steel trust, the harvest trust, the railroads, etc., we watch with mistrust and alarm their ruthless business methods in crushing out competition and controlling the markets and prices of our natural products. On the other side, if we look to the field of agriculture, we find for some cause or other the lack and spirit of organization. The farmer has not advanced much on this line. There have been farmers' alliances, granges, etc., but they never did much to advance his interest materially. For lack of organization as an individual the farmer deals with a combine which dictates to him a fixed price for what he buys and sells.

He has to divide his profits with different hangers on of society, so called middlemen, who do not produce, but live off their wits. Most of the old settlers in Tillamook are well aware, before the advent of the creamery, or the respective use of the separator, when butter was made by the gravity process, the shallow setting pan, and the output comparatively small.

How people, who pursued dairying, had to wait often six months or longer for their money after their product was sold in the market by the commission merchant.

We well remember how the first private creameries were conducted to the detriment of the dairymen, and how they had to wait for returns, had to borrow and pay big interest on his own money, purposely withheld, and loaned out by the parties in control of the business.

We owe an obligation to those enterprising and energetic men who organized the first co-operative creamery in Tillamook county, and notice how conditions have changed and improved all around. The dairymen get a better price for his butter and cheese, get quicker returns and is served better all around.

If we realize what co-operation has accomplished in other places, Hood River through her Fruit Growers' Association, has gained a world famed market for her fine apples, pears and the many varieties of other fruits.

Through the auspices of a Tillamook Dairymen's Association, the dairy products of Tillamook could be brought up to a higher standard of purity and gain a world renowned reputation for its fine flavors and qualities in other ways. The dairymen could often meet, discuss different problems, find out their needs, learn better business methods in marketing their products and buying their supplies, and deal absolute with merchants who stand for fair and honest dealings.

In many other things co-operation would serve the dairymen. Such as the selection of a proper dairy breed for this community. Where an individual, a poor man would almost meet with discouragement and failure, an organization, through united effort, would have more standing and be surer to succeed.

It would be of vital interest to all dairymen, as Professor Withycombe did in our annual fair, and pointed out the merits of selecting a good foundation for our future dairy herds. As it appears a good many dairymen are misled and influenced by individual dealers for certain breeds. But we should look further into this. Inquire into the community where dairying has been carried on successfully for years, as in Wisconsin, and get some information about the best dairy breed for our own purpose.

For instance, take the manufacture of cheese. As long as the patrons of the dairy are paid by butter fat, and keep the best breed of dairy cows, the ones who own the high testing cows get the benefit, especially during the last part of lactation, when milk is the richest, and a good deal of fat not absorbed in the cheese is going its way to the next question: Do we get in the market what we should, quality considered?

The tendency of the times will be closer organization necessary for our protection. We know how large concerns like the Swifts and Armour's are out for control of farmer's output. As the cattle market is controlled, we may predict as soon as the milk machine is made a success it will revolutionize the dairy industry, interest capital, crowd out the small farmer and be the outcome of a struggle of the strongest and fittest.

How Some of It Was Luckily Saved From Destruction.

Considering that the whole of ancient literature was confined to manuscript, it is wonderful that so much of it has come down to us. The preservation of some old writings has been almost miraculous. To a single copy preserved in a monastery of Westphalia, for instance, do we owe all that we have of Tacitus. This is the more remarkable since the emperor of that name had copies of the works of his distinguished ancestor placed in all the imperial libraries and caused two copies of them to be transcribed yearly. Still, only the one copy has been found in modern times.

A page of the second decade of Livy, we are told, was discovered by a man of letters on a battlefield while he was amusing himself in the country. He rushed up to town, but he was too late, for the battledoor maker "had used up all his parchment the week before." Two manuscripts of Cicero on "Glory" were presented to Petrarch, who lent them to an old preceptor. This latter gentleman, being pressed by want, pawned them and died without revealing the name of the pawnbroker. Two centuries afterward they were mentioned in a catalogue of books bequeathed to a convent, but could not be found. It is supposed that Petrus Aleyonius, the physician to the institution, appropriated them and, having transcribed some of the thoughts to his own writings, destroyed the originals.
