Astoria dance halls have closed and the gamblers in that city have closed down because a grand jury is to be called. It is thought on gamblers and not surprising that Astoria should become tired of harboring a lot of gambling thieves who live on blood money. Juvenile courts have come to stay, and the cost should not cut any figure when it is possible to make good citizens out of boys and girls who may have happened to have done wrong.

Chapter V.—Without in any way accusing anyone of the alleged graft of \$10,000 in connection with the construction of the Tillamook City water system, we have said enough to justify the matter being sifted by a grand jury, so it is now up to the district attorney's office to make an investigation and prosecute, if the allegation is proven, those who were implicated. That is the proper course, for it is in the grand jury room and not in the newspapers that the matter should be sifted and cleared up in justice to all parties. This is no time, however for anyone to threaten the Press or anyone else with persecution or to apply the "gag" to compel the Press to "shut up." It is a time for calm investigation, and we have said enough to justify this, for it is plain that parties have done some "squealing." And because the Press happened to repeat some of the "squealings," there are those who want to jump onto the Headlight man. But how foolish. We cannot help it if people "squeal."
