Editorial Snap Shots.

We heartily coincide with our contemporary that the curfew law should be enforced, and we must give Rollie credit for being sincere in this, even if he is a rabid saloon advocate.

The fraternal spirit amongst the Masonic brethren in this city must be at a low ebb if Rollie's repeated and unwarranted attacks on his worthy brothers are any criterion to judge by.

It was a long and tedious fight to kill the obnoxious and illegal Wilson River toll road contract, but it is now dead and stinks so loud with political rotteness that we do not know of anyone who is anxious to attend the funeral.

Those who have been held up and grafted for toll on the Wilson River road are now in a position to retaliate. The Wilson River Road Company, J. H. McNamer and Wesley Rush had no right to hold people up and compel them to pay toll. It was illegal to do so.

The Wilson River toll road contract and the 40 per cent commission contract for collecting delinquent taxes and other monies owing the county have had a terrible shaking up, and they ought to, for it was wrong and against the interest of the taxpayers to ever enter into such agreements.

There appears to have been a racket at a school meeting at Blaine this week. Now, gentlemen, for your own reputation, the reputation of your section of the county, and for the reputation of your school, please cut it out and show a better example to the children of your district. Be men, and don't act like a lot of quarrelsome kids, or the Headlight man will have to apply the rawhide.

The speaker at the union temperance meeting in this city on Sunday did not place the saloon bums, the men who hang round and clean out the spittoons for the big burly saloon keepers, upon a very high footing in the community. Before he'd do that, said the speaker, he'd go and kill himself. Of course, no offence was intended to the saloon spittoon cleaners who used to hang around the saloons in this county.

All that the county claimed, even by the experts statement, was about \$80000 shortage in the Alderman accounts, yet the attorneys who represented Tillamook county sued for \$33,550.05. With that notorious 40 per cent contract in force, if the attorneys could have recovered this amount wouldn't they have had a bonanza? It is just as well for everybody to admit it, for it is a fact, the attorneys for the county made a genuine fizzle of the whole affair.

For a number of years the people of Oregon have been told, and especially at the last election, that the office of state printer was the biggest "graft" in the state. So the state legislature passed a bill to put the state printer on a flat salary after the expiration of the present incumbent's term. Strange to relate, Governor Chamberlain vetoed the bill which was to cut off this "graft."

Governor Chamberlain said, in vetoing the appropriations for the Monmouth and Drain normal schools, that Speaker Davey auctioned the people's rights to

the highest bidder. This Davey denies, coming back at the governor with hot shot, calling Chamberlain the most artful demagogue that ever hoodwinked a people. To be in fashion, Davey should have said that the head of the governor's political machine was suffering with "brain storm." But, gentlemen, please be gentlemen.

There are quite a few well meaning persons who have expressed regret the J. L. Arstall did not make good his escape when he first broke jail. Had he done so and gone to some place and become a man amongst men it might have been the best thing that could have happened to him. We doubt whether he would have done this, however, for Arstall has started on a career that is going to add him to the criminal class of this country, and the longer he can be sent to the penitentiary better it will be for the people.

We were told that several persons were rubbernecking with a view to catch the snap shot man violate the bicycle ordinance. They will have to rubble, for although the ordinance has not been enforced, the snap shot man has always made it a point to dismount, when meeting a pedestrian. The ordinance is a good one, and on account of so many young persons riding recklessly makes the ordinance necessary. But there is this much about it, it is not fair to allow persons to violate the law for months and then pounce down upon a certain few and single them out for prosecution. That looks like persecution.

The news confirming the sale of the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad to James J. Hill is good news for Tillamook County, for with the Hill system extended from Seaside and built through the county, this is liable to become the commercial road on account of its water level construction. Hill will invade Tillamook County, which until recently, was considered Harriman territory, so it is a source of congratulation to this county, after so many years of patient waiting, that these two railroad magnates are to have competing lines and are hurrying the construction of them.

There is some talk amongst citizens of this county who were interested in the Beals' timber cruising assessment bill, which was defeated by the senate, to invoke the initiative and referendum, and in this way submit it to a vote of the people in June, 1908. Another bill, that of Newell, of Washington county, to tax water power 50c. per year per horse power, which was defeated in the house, is likely to be submitted also to a vote of the people. And why not the Beals' bills for a dairy and creamery inspector, which was vetoed by Governor Chamberlain?

Rollie had another "brain storm" this week, which is more in the nature of a personal attack upon Mayor Botts than anyone else. Mr. Botts has surely the right to express his opinion in regard to who ought to be or ought not to be the city's peace officer. It seems that he objects to Huntsinger on account of Billy Stephens and Frank Buttz being on his bond. It was unfortunate for Huntsinger that he had these persons on his bond, but it is perfectly proper and the correct thing for Mayor Botts to draw attention to this, and most persons will commend him, for he is certainly as anxious as anyone to procure a peace

officer who will enforce the law. If Huntsinger fails to get the increase in wages it will be on account of Rollie's "brain storm" and unwarranted attack on Mayor Botts this week, for it looks as though the councilmen are just as anxious as the mayor to procure the services of a person who will do his duty as a peace officer and that they are going to do what they think is best for the interest of the city. As Rollie wanted to be the big mogul of the city, he seems to hool over once in a while because the people turned him down, and it was a good thing for the city that they did so.

The city council is again up against the old bone of contention, that of the enforcement of law and in the selection of a peace officer who will do his sworn duty. It is not surprising to the Headlight that there are so many mischievous and bad boys and girls who are giving the city a touch name, for the city is only reaping what it sowed. For years the city paid a city marshal \$50 a month to protect violators of the law, and with so many of the parents coinciding with and lining up with the lawbreakers, it is not surprising, with those environments for so many years, that so many of the boys and girls have started out to become toughs, and are liable to remain toughs all their lives because their parents and the city officials failed to exercise the restraining influence over them. But, as we said before, Tillamook City is only reaping the seeds that it sowed because the parents and city officials for a number of years neglected to apply the breaks and place the rising generation under proper control. Mayor Botts and the city council appear to be very anxious to bring about a change in the moral atmosphere of the city, but their greatest difficulty is in finding a person who will do his duty and make the boys and girls understand that this rowdism must stop and remain so.

The relief demanded in the complaint is, that a strip of land 100 feet in width, being 50 feet in width on each side of the center line of plaintiff's line of railway as the same is now surveyed, located, staked out and adopted as a right of way, and that the amount of compensation to be paid therefor be determined, and for such other judgment as may appear just.

The center line of plaintiff's said line of railway, as surveyed, located, adopted and staked out over and along the premises aforesaid, is more particularly described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at Engineer's Station 224.43, situated at a point on the South boundary line of said Section 32, 125 feet West of the corner to Sections 4, 5, 32 and 33, thence by tangent North 13 degrees West, 4089.210 feet; thence by a one degree curve to the left 1442.810 feet to a point on the North line of said Section 32, 135 feet West of the corner to Sections 28, 29, 32 and 33, all in said Township, Range, County and State.
