

**Editorial Snap Shots.**

It looks as though, from the fifth on some of the cows which are now running at large in the city, that they need the muck rake.

Wesley Rush has torn down the fence and toll gate on the Wilson river. We wonder whether he is getting ready to pay back the money he extracted from the traveling public?

There is this satisfaction about the government reserving the burned districts in the south part of the county for a forest reserve, the timber cruisers will not be able to locate people on it after showing them a fine body of timber elsewhere.

The railroad magnates had a "brain storm" last week, talking about ruin and bankruptcy. Rats! Roosevelt ought to put all the railroad presidents into the hands of a receiver, for it was only a few months ago that, for want of equipment, they had to admit that they could not and cannot now handle all the business offered, so they want to bring on a panic.

The Coast Counties, south of Clatsop, by the recent order of President Roosevelt, setting aside 4,051,000 additional acres in Oregon as forest reserves, does not appear to be getting a square deal by the manner in which a large portion of the land along the Coast is withdrawn from entry. From the map published in the Oregonian it looks as though most of the land in this county south of Cape Lookout and Spruce is placed in the reserve.

We do not believe the report that the plans for the extension of the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad will be put off, but, on the other hand, we believe this, as soon as the road is turned over to Mr. Hill, work will proceed as rapidly as possible. And in proof of this, watch the proceedings of the circuit court in this city and see the determined fight the Hill people will put up to secure the right of way from Clatsop's county line to this city. Hill is after feeders for his road, and he could not get a better feeder than Tillamook county.

The strike of the saw mill hands in Portland resembles somewhat the A.P.A. movement in that city some years ago. Men rushed blindly into that order because some persons raised a bugaboo, and so intense was the excitement, men did not stop to consider what they were doing, but, like a band of sheep, plunged headlong into the A.P.A. Someone must have raised a similar bugaboo and instigated the mill hands in Portland, causing them to join the Industrial Workers of the World at the instigation of labor agitators, throwing up jobs with good wages. No wonder that the strike in Portland suddenly went to pieces, as it was bound to, for there was no cause for the men to quit their work and walk out.

All that it would have cost the state for the salary of the dairy and creamery inspector was \$1,500 a year, but Gov. Chamberlain vetoed the bill. George was playing politics, for presently he will take the stump and tell the dear people what a lot of money he was saving the people. But what about the dairy industry and the efforts put forth to place clean, wholesome dairy products upon the market? Why Chamberlain was so short sighted and generous that out of enormous appropriations passed by the state legislature he would not allow the bill for a dairy and creamery inspector, at a salary of only \$1,500, to become a law, because it would not help George's political machine. However, the people elected a politician instead of a farmer for governor, so it is not much good for the dairy interests of Tillamook county to attempt to kick, but the dairymen have just cause to kick now, and we suppose they will continue to kick.

We have received a lengthy communication from L. J. Arstall, the bank check forger, who is now confined in the county jail. A man who has forged a number of checks and cashed them, and who preferred to commit suicide, worked the insanity dodge and broke jail on two occasions, is hardly entitled to space in these columns in a rambling article denouncing the gamblers and those who sold doped whiskey in this city, which Arstall claims was the cause of his downfall. However that may be, we are not in a position to say. It may be true and it may not, but any young man who has respect for himself ought to keep away from gambling dens and where they sell doped whiskey. Many bright young men have been ruined by going to such places, but there is logic in Arstall's argument when he says he made a mistake in not rounding up the gamblers and those who sold doped whiskey, and to come down to the gist of the whole matter it is coming to be generally recognized that the gambler is in the same class as the thief, the robber, and the forger, and the proper place for all of them is in the state penitentiary, where Arstall will find himself before he is a month older. Let Arstall's career be a warning to every young man in Tillamook, more especially if it was brought on by gambling, for once confined in the pen, he will regret the day he ever stepped into a gambling joint. It is not too late for Arstall to inform on the gambling houses, the gamblers and the doped whiskey sellers, if that is his regret.
