W. Powell and T. Coates, who allowed \$1,254. Part of this will not be paid until Mr. Freeman has done certain work.

The contestants have been hard at work for the past month preparing to uphold the honor of their respective societies.

Two sailors, the worse for drink, on Tuesday, caused a disturbance and attempted to do up the boys who were at tending the pie social, and the jack tars finding that they had tackled too big a job when the young Tillamookers turned in to retaliate, which caused the tars to set sail and run for dear life, with a lot of infuriated boys right on their trail to the gravel pit.

District Attorney J. H. McNary will not be able to attend the April term of the circuit court, which meets on the 15th. He contracted a cold going out after the November term and has been unable to shake it off, so had to make arrangements for a vacation. Judge W. Galloway has also been sick and Judge Harris took his place on the bench in Linn county.

The price of butter fat at the different factories for February is about the highest in the history of the county. This surely, claps the climax: Maple Leaf, 34c.; Clover Leaf, 37c.; Red Clover, 38c.; Tillamook Creamery, 39c.; Fairview, first half 29c., second half, 30c. Is there any better argument in favor of winter dairying than this?

The county court has instructed the road supervisor to inspect the Wilson river road and report as to what repairs are necessary to make it fit for travel. It is thought that about \$500 will be sufficient to spend on the road this summer. As there is such a strong opposition to making it a toll road again, the county court will not lease it again. It seems that John McNamer is wanting the county court to pay him for one of the bridges.

Cohn & Co. have sold their store building and stock of groceries to George K. Edmunds, the deal having been made on Monday, and he will take possession of the building and goods about the first of the month, continuing the grocery, flour and feed business. Cohn & Co. are making arrangements to dispose of the dry goods and hardware, as they are going out of business. Cohn & Co. is one of the oldest business firms in the county, having done a large amount of business and has the confidence of the people. The steam schooner Coquille River, which came near being wrecked two weeks ago, was taken to Portland and docked for repairs. She was examined at Astoria by Captain Crowe, marine surveyor. The ship was fitted with iron piping, which was so badly rusted at some of the joints that it crumbled when pressure was applied. Her pumps were also badly worn and would hardly work. The average life of iron piping in a steam vessel is five years, but the piping in the Coquille River was more than 11 years old. Aside from the pumps and fittings, the Coquille River was found to be in good condition. She was built in 1896, and has been operated between Coast points ever since that time.

Mrs. N. P. Hansen died at her home near Three Rivers last Monday evening, March 25th, after two months suffering from stomach trouble which she patiently endured, retaining her mind to the last. Mrs. Hansen was a daughter of Mrs. A. D. Sanders of this place, she was born in Atchison County Kansas, Oct. 18th, 1868. She was married to N. P. Hansen, Oct. 20th, 1883, in this county and from this union eight children were born, seven of whom are living and are at home with the father. The funeral services were held at the home by Rev. C. H. Waymire on Tuesday and interment was made in the I.O.O.F. cemetery. Mr. and Mrs. Hansen are well known throughout the county and Mr. Hansen and family have the sympathy of all and they acknowledge gratefully the assistance and sympathy extended to them by friends and neighbors in their sad bereavement.—Cloverdale Courier.

County Court Proceedings.

An adjourned term of the Board of County Commissioners was held Friday and Saturday, when County Judge H. F. Goudspeed and Commissioner Geo. W. Bodelfelt were present.

The report of the board of county road viewers was filed, and it was ordered that in the matter of the petition of D. T. Werschkul and others to vacate portion of county road, it was ordered that the petition be granted.

It was ordered that the Clerk draw a warrant for \$175 in favor of Rice and Phelan for powder used in district No. 1.

In regard to obstructing the Wilson river road by the Tillamook Logging Company, which is reported to be damaging the road in various places by falling trees, drawing logs across the road without suitable crossings and setting logging engines in the road, and in various ways hindering public travel, the road supervisor was ordered to notify the logging company to remove all obstructions and place the road bed in good condition and that where it is necessary for the company to draw logs across the road to provide suitable crossings, and should the logging company fail to remove all obstruction the road supervisor is ordered to do so.
