Vents Her Wrath on Judge.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 3.—Ten days ago Judge W. W. Zent, in the Benton Superior Court, decided the case of James McKivitt vs H. J. Thomas, a suit for a wheat crop involving about \$600 for the defendant, assessing \$76 costs against the plaintiff, who is a Horse Heaven rancher. As a result of the decision, Mrs. McKivitt addressed an insulting letter to Judge Zent, who lives at Ritzville, saying he had sold out cheap, was dishonest, that there was no such thing as justice in his court, and that she should have taken the law in her own hands and shot Thomas down like a coyote.

By order of the Judge Mrs. McKivitt was arrested and arranged in court at 10 o'clock this morning for contempt. Her husband made a plea for mercy on the ground that the letter was written in the heat of passion. She pleaded guilty, was fined \$50 and costs and ordered committed to jail until paid.

The woman protested violently, declaring she would not pay the fine, remarking in a whisper as she left the court room that she would write another letter and calling the judge a young upstart. Judge Zent recalled her to the bar and administered a stern lecture, and would have committed her to jail but for the plea of her husband, who urged that she did not realize the enormity of her offense.

The women raved after being removed to the Sheriff's office, where she abused the judge and remarked that she would pay the fine.

Late this afternoon through the influence of her husband and friends, she wrote an abject apology to the judge, retracing every thing she had said, declaring she respected him as a man and judge, and acknowledging the letter was insulting and also defamatory. The judge suspended sentence pending good behavior, releasing Mrs. McKivitt on her own recognizance.
