Editorial Snap Shots.

It is a wilful waste of paint to cover up the old shacks with a new dress. Is that civic pride? It was contempt of court for Judge Cooper to become a grandpa while the circuit court was in session. "That ain't no fair," for H. V. Alley to get into office without spending his first year's salary treating the boys with cigars. Over in Washington a woman insulted a judge and although inclined to be more lenient after being called to account, she had to meekly apologise. What a blessing! Circuit court is over and the attorney can take a rest—on chewing the rag over some case tried in England or the North Pole several hundred years ago. Tillamook is growing right along, for new settlers are arriving most every day, with the prospect that the county's population will be increased several thousand sands before the summer is over. We do not possess a noisy little honk, but we have a right to honk, too, when the big honk swiped the commissioners' court proceedings again from last week's Headlight. Honk! Honk! Honk! The newspapers are having a good deal to say in answer to the query as to the definition of a democrat. If we may be allowed to answer the question for a number of democrats in Tillamook, we will say they are simply pups to the plutocrats. As to taking the matter of opening a street in Tillamook City into the circuit court we only express the sentiment of a good many citizens when we say that it was ill-advised and altogether out of place, for it is not right to fasten the expense of a purely city affair upon the taxpayers of the county in trying such a case. Judge Galloway has granted a new trial, and this will entail another trial of two days, in all probably, and at an expense to the county and inconvenience of thirty jurors from all parts of the county. This is how we look at such matters: If a city property owner does not want and can prevent the improvement of a street and the laying of a sidewalk abutting his property, then he ought to be prevented from using the streets and sidewalks paid for by other property owners. Attorneys may think that this is poor law, but when properly reasoned out it is good horse sense, and it is good horse sense also for the taxpayers of the county to protest against having to foot the bill trying purely city affairs.
