IMPORTANT CHANGES IN OREGON SCHOOL LAW.

Made by the Last Legislature Gives More Money to Districts.

There are a number of changes in the new state school law of Oregon which goes into effect May 25. These changes are of interest to all teachers and parents. The following are some extracts from the new law.

1. Only one second and one third grade certificate can be secured in the state.
 2. Mental arithmetic has been dropped from all examinations for county papers.
 3. After February 1, 1908, all applicants for first grade must be examined in literature and physical geography.
 4. It shall be the duty of the state board of education to indicate at least one year before examination for certificate, the source of sources from which at least 60 per cent of the questions in theory and practice will be selected.
 5. Teachers or the principal shall make monthly reports showing registration, attendance, tardiness and such other information as required on the blanks furnished by the superintendent of public instruction.
 6. The school superintendent shall require teachers, before beginning to teach in any school district in his county, to register all diplomas and certificates and previously registered in his county and file a copy of the contract. Should any teacher fail to register diploma or certificate or file contract, said teacher shall forfeit the full amount of her salary for the time already taught. Should any school board fail to enforce such forfeiture the county superintendent shall deduct the said amount from the next apportionment of county school fund due said district.
 7. The clerk shall refuse to draw an order for the teachers' wages for the last month until the teacher's register shall have been completely filled out, filed and approved by the clerk.
 8. Eighty-five per cent of the county and state funds shall be paid to the teacher.
 9. The county court is compelled to levy \$7 per capita.
 10. The annual census shall be taken the last week in November.
 11. All school districts must secure a flag and keep it flying at or near the school house on all favorable days.
 12. All districts must have at least four months school during the year.
 13. Two or more school districts may be united for the purpose of establishing and carrying on high schools or grades above the eighth. Such schools are known as union high schools and will in no way affect the present organization of the district or the first eight grades.
 14. School officers' convention or conventions may be held once a year. This convention may include the entire county or the county may be divided into districts. The chairman of the board is made the delegate, but in case he cannot attend, he must appoint some member of his board. Each delegate receives \$2 a day providing he attends the entire session of the convention.
 15. Compulsory education law. All children between the ages of 9 and 14 years must attend school for the entire time school is in session in the district. All children between the ages of 14 and 16 must go to school or be engaged in some occupation, according to the provisions of the child labor law. Excepting to these requirements are children in private schools, pupils physically unable to attend, pupils of 10, living more than 1 1/2 miles from school, pupils of any age living more than three miles from school and pupils under private tutos at home.
- The different steps in carrying out this law are: 1. Appointment of truant officers-in and for each district by the district boundary board. One officer may be appointed for several districts. 2. First-class districts have power to call on regular police officers. 3. County superintendent furnish truant officers with a list of teachers of the district.
4. The clerk gives the teacher a list of the enumeration on the first day of each term, or immediately after the enumeration is taken. 5. The teacher compares registration with the census enumeration at the end of each

month. 6. The teacher reports delinquents to secretary of the boundary board. 7. Secretary reports to truant officer. 8. The officer notifies parents or guardians that the children must be in school on the following Monday morning and reports to the teacher that the parents have been notified. 9. In case the children are not sent to school the officer makes complaint to the justice of peace. 10. Justice issues warrant and conducts trial. The punishment for truancy is a fine from \$5 to \$20 or imprisonment from two to 10 days. Any officers whose duty it is to help enforce the law, may be fined from \$5 to \$20 for failure to perform the duties incumbent upon them under this act. This includes the county court and school superintendent, who are members of the district boundary board, the teachers and school clerk.

SUBSCRIBERS TO THE RIGHT OF WAY.
 Second Assessment of 25 per cent is Made.

The right of way committee has made another 25 per cent assessment upon the subscribers who guaranteed a free right of way for the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company, which will be the last assessment until the railroad is finished and ready for business. This makes half of the money subscribed called for, but quite a number of the subscribers have already paid their entire subscriptions. Mr. H. T. Botts is the secretary of the right of way committee, to whom the second assessment must be paid as soon as possible.
