H. L. Chapin and W. B. A large congrega-tion attended the funeral service, thereby showing their respect for the deceased lady and in sympathy for the bereaved children and relatives.

The uniforms for the Tillamook Brass Band came in on the steamer on Satur-day, and the boys made their debut in their new togs on Wednesday evening by giving a band concert on the business streets. One week from Saturday the band will give a concert at the opera house, assisted by a number of lady vocalists. Mr. G. M. Watkins, who died in this city on Thursday evening, was buried on Saturday, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. D. L. Shrode in the M.E. church in this city. Mr. Watkins was born in Tennessee on the 6th April, 1846 He went to lowa when he was six years old. He was married in that state to Miss N. J. Funk in 1868. They came to Oregon in 1873, settling in Linn county, and his wife died on June 6, 1897. He came to Tillamook about nine years ago, living on his farm at Netarts, where he was much respected. A suit was filed in the circuit court or Tuesday by the Tillamook Lumbering Company against W. J. Woodside, of Sau Francisco, for \$4,000. PLAT OF BAYOCEAN PARK.

Filed with County Clerk-Contains 4,030 Lots-Reserves for Hotel. Pier. Bath House, Pavilion etc.

The Potter-Chapin Realty Company filed with the County Clerk on Monday the plat of Bayocean Park. The land em braced in the proposed park contains the peninsula of Tillamook Bay, locally known as the Sand Spit, embraces the land on the Cape and extends the whole length of the peninsula, having a water frontage on the ocean and one on the pay as well. The land is platted with streets and a ocean and bay boulevard, and contains 4,030 lots, mostly 50ft, by 100ft. On the ocean side, and in about the center of the peninsula, 100ft, above sea level, a reserve is made for the large hotel which is to be built, and adjoining this, on the north, is another piece of land reserved for a bath house. In a direct line from this, on the Bay side of the peninsula, land is reserved for a pier, boat house and pavilion. A channel is to be dredged to connect with the chan-nel on the west side of the bay, so that vessels can reach the pier. Water is to be obtained from the Cape and will be piped the whole length of the peninsula. In the long narrow neck of the peninsula, which is only 320ft, wide, a row of lots face the ocean and another row face the bay. There is also reserved, on the bay rener of the sand spit is a government

If the present plans of the promoters of this proposed summer resort are carried out, it will be necessary to have a wagon road built to Bayocean Park, and this can be done by crossing Tillamook river, west of Tillamook City, and thence through the Elmore ranch, making a water level road around the west and south sides of the Cape to Bayocean and south sides of the Cape to Bayocean Park, which would make a very pretty road for driving and automobiles, giving that section of the country a way out
