William Muller, a young man only 20 years of age, committed suicide Friday morning by hanging himself from a tree. He was recently from Germany and lived in a tent on an homestead with his brother, Max Muller, near Beaver. He had, it appears, become despondent, on account of not hearing from home, and fastening a rope around his neck he climbed up a tree and fastened the other end of the rope. Sliding down the tree, he let loose with only about two feet of rope from his neck to the limb where he had tied it, and in that position he slowly strangled to death. Coroner C. E. Reynolds was notified, and after investigating decided that he would not hold an inquest.

The cost of the new station will be \$10,000, and the equipment will add \$15,000 more to the government's bill. The station will be first class in every respect, including the lifeboat, which will be a motor boat and is under construction in the East. It will be about 34 feet long and non-sinkable.
