PLAN AUTOMOBILE BOULEVARD TO BEACHES.

From Portland, Through McMinnville, Sheridan and Dolph to Tillamook.

The building of an automobile boulevard to Tillamook and the beach through Lafayette, McMinnville, Sheridan, Willamina, Grand Ronde, Dolph and Oretown is one of the latest improvements being agitated by Portland motorists.

W. J. Clemens, almost as well known as a motor enthusiast as an insurance man, took a trip over the road a week ago and on his return he pronounced the route the only feasible one for an automobile boulevard from Portland to Tillamook and beach points.

The Clemens party consisted of Mr. and Mrs. Clemens, H. E. Clemens, Miss Lillian Clemens and W. J. Lyons. They left on July fourth in Mr. Clemens 35 horse power Mitchell touring car.

The worst stretch of road was between Dolph and Oretown. The distance is 29 miles, for the driver must go around by Cloverdale.

The Clemens trip was made shortly after a heavy rain and the mud in spots was unusually troublesome. Nevertheless, no serious mishaps occurred.

The counties will be urged to cooperate in the work and money will be secured from this end from the good roads fund and through private subscriptions from the many Portland motoring enthusiasts.
