**Wants Automobile Road.**  
 A number of business men and others waited on the Board of County Commissioners on Tuesday to ascertain what the county would do towards the proposed automobile boulevard being built into Tillamook county, either over the Wilson River route or by way of Sheridan. Messrs. James Walton, Gus Kunze, Rollie W. Watson, Henry Kunze, M. F. Leach, Alex. McNair, W. C. King, C. I. Clough and others joined in the discussion, and from what they said the delegation was in favor of the county helping to the extent of an equal amount of money put up by the automobilists, that it favored the Wilson river route, that it would be a good investment, as it would bring thousands of dollars into the county, that the expense should be borne by the county and not by subscriptions by people of this county, who had recently subscribed towards the right of way for a railroad, which had doubled values in Tillamook, and that something ought to be done to make this county a great summer resort. County Judge Goodspeed dropped a few remarks during the informal talk, in which he said he was in favor of spending all the money they could get upon improving the roads, but was opposed to spending money upon automobile roads and leaving the Netarts, Sandlake, Slab Creek, Blaine and other roads in their present condition, all of which needed improving. He was not in favor of going into debt and having to pay interest, and he made the statement that it would be necessary to levy a 10 mill road tax next year, which would raise \$80,000, if all the proposed road improvements were taken in hand. Commissioner Alley said they did not have enough money this year to spend on roads which needed improving. He wanted a little time to consider the matter, but it looked to him that if the south route was chosen the money expended on the road would be of greater benefit to the settlers than the Wilson River road. Commissioner Body-it coincided with the other commissioner as to the south route, but would not oppose the Wilson river road if that was eventually selected, but he would subscribe \$50 if the south route was chosen.
