Her husband owns grazing land there, and every summer he brings in a band of sheep to graze on the mountain. Owing to the varmint in that vicinity he herds them at night and sleeps in the day. When Mr. Johnson left Monday his wife was in her usual health, but when he returned at an early hour next morning she was a corpse, her two young children being in bed with their mother, but were too young to realize what had happened. Mr. Johnson obtained assistance as soon as he could and took the body to Lafayette for burial.

Bud Withrow and family, Young McKinley, J. D. and Frank Whiteaker returned a day or two ago from the Tillamook carnival and fair held at Tillamook City last week. The fair was a big success and large numbers were in attendance, many from the valley taking in the doings. Withrow and McKinley tried their luck fishing for salmon and had the biggest success of their lives, landing in a few hours between 60 and 70 fine ones, weighing from 2½ pounds up to 6 and 7 pounds. They happened to strike a very favorable locality, and which produced the above results. The boys have a photograph of their catch, which is certainly a big one to be taken with hook and line.—West Side Enterpriser.

A large whale washed up on Wednesday of last week on Netarts beach, on what was formerly the Kunze place, but now owned by the Netarts Bay Improvement Company. Some children living on the place first discovered it, but not knowing what it was, returned to the farm and reported that something had washed up, and as soon as Messrs. Henderson and Levitt, who are renting the place were through with their milking they went on the beach to see what it was. They found a large whale, which was on its back and its mouth open, had been washed ashore. The monster was 55 feet long, had a number of barnacles on its tail, and had evidently been dead for some time, for when the tide deceded it commenced to decay under the sun's rays. Quite a number went to Netarts to see the leviathan.

A sad drowning accident occurred at Bay City sometime last Thursday afternoon, when Edward Williams, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Williams, lost his life, the particulars of which will never be known, for no one witnessed the accident. The boy was about 9 years of age, and it is surmised that he pushed his father's boat, which had been left on the tide lands, into the water, for it was found afloat. The boy had either fallen or jumped out of the boat, and probably became stuck in the mud and drowned in that way. The boy's absence from home soon caused alarm, and although searching parties were organized it was not until the afternoon of the next day that the lifeless body was found, and another victim to be added to the long list of drowning accidents in this county. The funeral took place on Saturday last, a number of friends attending in sympathy with the grief stricken parents and relatives.
