Editorial Snap Shots.

Say, boys, get busy over in Clatsop county with that long predicted railroad which was to enter Tillamook county first, for the time is now ripe to "Make Good."

We notice that several of the Oregon newspapers have raised the subscription price from \$1 to \$1.50, and it looks as if some of them will have to quit taking ads, for next to nothing if they expect to keep their heads above water.

Why so many persons seem to think that something is going to happen to the building for the railroad for a time we cannot understand. We have not caught on to any Indian informant to that effect yet. But wouldn't it be as all up if anything like that had to happen?

A friend at our elbow suggests that the newspaper men of Oregon would better be careful what they do at the meeting of the State Press Association in Astoria tomorrow, lest the Federal grand jury indict them for organizing a trust. Not a bit of danger. Nobody ever heard of two newspaper men agreeing for five minutes on any subject.—Observer.

It is about time for those who want to get into public office to commence the process of grooming themselves, but it is well to give them a bit of advice if the political lightning does not strike them at the primary election, not to turn them selves into political mules, knocking the party because they were not popular or thought competent to receive a nomination.

Before the county decides to build a road to Bayocan Park, the Potter Chapin Realty Company would do well to announce to what amount it would give towards it. A road to the park will be a necessity, and with a beautiful drive around the bay it will greatly enhance the value of the park and make it much more popular. Money talks. It is up to the promoters to help out and get the work started as soon as possible.

We have failed to see that any money has been put up by the automobilists to build a tunnel between Portland and Tillamook. There is no doubt that all the counties through which the road would pass will be glad to help. It means better wagon roads for the settlers. It is up to the Portland automobilists to say to what extent they are ready to help and get the road constructed so as to be in shape for next year's travel.

Will anyone now undertake to dispute us that it was pettifoggery tactics which were used in the Aldermen cases. And after thousands of dollars had been paid to experts. But what about the 40 per cent commission in that notorious contract, since Tillamook county has been knocked out in the courts at every point and hasn't a leg to stand on, for the whole affair appears to be outlawed? That is what the taxpayers got by not forcing the proper officials to look after the county's business.

What is the matter with the globes that they burn out an often, depriving the city of street lights? There is something wrong somewhere, for there is no sense in paying for street lights when some of them are out most of the time, and if it is the globes, which have been a source of large expense to the city for a number of years, for a matter of economy and public convenience, this needs to be investigated by the city officials, for it would surprise a good many persons if the amount was totaled up that was paid out for globes the last five or six years.

Every once in a while we came across a pessimist who gives Tillamook county the devil, sees no need of a railroad and predicts that the logs will be taken to Portland and manufactured. Not much. J. C. Covey is in charge of the railroad and completed hundreds of sawmills, box factories and shingle mills will start up in this county, and if the railroad does haul logs it will be principally to mills and factories here. The railroad is sure to foster mills and factories along its line, for there will be more money in hauling finished lumber out of the county than there would be in hauling logs to Portland. It must be more reckless for pessimists in Tillamook to see how rapidly the county is developing.

It happens quite often that some of the citizens want news items suppressed from the newspapers. Editors should not discriminate, for the reason they are in the news business and the people expect the news. It is no fault of the editor if a person gets arrested, is sued, or gets into some scrape, which becomes public records. We have learned this in the newspaper business. It is perfectly proper, in the eyes of some persons, to report everything about other people, but when it comes to their turn to come under the limelight or get a little wholesome criticism, then the editor is called a devil of a bad man, and should be hanged to be an editor in Tillamook, the offended parties declare he knocks everything and ought to be boycotted and run out of the county. It is very amusing, but it is the same old age, it depends upon whose ox is being gored. If the editor is a bad man in the community for reporting news or criticizing matters of public interest, then we plead

guilty. But, then, what are the parties going to do about it? The Press is in Tillamook to say and is now firmly established.

Millions for Timber.

It will be seen in the real estate transfers that William H. White has bought over 17,000 acres of timber lands, on the Wilson river from different parties, some of those who disposed of their holdings being Jacob H. Cook and N. P. Wheeler, 5585 acres, the price, as recorded, being \$194,000; Nelson F. Wheeler, 8549 1/2 acres, \$229,000; Jacob H. Cook, 3370 acres, \$128,000; W. N. Jones, 1081 acres, \$27,500.

Another large timber deal has just been closed, transferring to L. B. Menefee of Portland, 14,000 acres of standing timber in Tillamook county. The consideration is something over \$1,000,000. The timber will, it is estimated, cost more than 1,000,000,000 feet of merchantable lumber.

The deal was made through Percy Allen, W. H. Bury and J. E. Wheeler. The timber lands are in the region of the Wilson river, and adjacent to projected railroads that will ultimately make the stumpage easily available to the markets. Fir largely predominates in the tract, and there is also some hemlock and spruce.

This is the second large purchase of Oregon timber made by Mr. Menefee. Last fall, with two associates, I. M. Rockwell and Jesse H. Jones of Houston, bought 9,000 acres in Marion and Jackson counties, paying \$900,000 for the property. The lumber manufacturers of the south are beginning to recognize the fact that the standing timber of the Northwest, and especially Oregon, offers the only field available for future operations in this industry.

The mills of Mr. Menefee are rapidly cutting his timber in Louisiana, and he is preparing for the time when they will have to close down. He recently located in Portland for permanent residence, and will ultimately engage in the milling business here. He and other southern investors are becoming heavily interested in Oregon, and are receiving the cordial welcome they deserve.—Oregon Journal.

The above lands were the holdings of Bloodgett & Danaher, but the deals have not been recorded yet.

MRS. ALDERMAN WINS SUIT.

Supreme Court Decides Against the County of Tillamook.

The Supreme Court has handed down a decision in the case of Edith M. Alderman against the County of Tillamook, asking an injunction against the removal by the County Court of the plaintiff as administratrix of her husband's estate. The lower court sustained a demurrer on the part of the county, and the Supreme Court reverses this judgment. The opinion, which is written by Justice Beahm, contains the following: "From the allegations of the complaint, which for the purposes of this appeal are admitted by the demurrer, and must be taken as true, a case appealing more strongly to a court of equity for relief could rarely be found. The plaintiff and defendant, at the time the proceedings for her removal were instituted in the County Court, were engaged in litigation over a claim for a large amount of money asserted by the county against the estate of which plaintiff is administratrix. The county had brought sundry actions, suits and proceedings to establish its claim. The plaintiff was making an honest and apparently successful defense thereto, and the county had been unable to establish its claim. To prevent the plaintiff from making such defense and to enable the county to succeed in the litigation, it instituted proceedings for her removal in the court presided over by the person who had been most active on its behalf and under whose direction the litigation was being conducted. To give it an apparent standing to maintain such proceedings it alleges that it was a creditor of the estate, although it had not established its claim to that relationship and was not entitled to the rights of a creditor. It seems manifest, therefore, that the proceeding could not have been instituted in good faith, but for the purpose of vexing and harassing the plaintiff, and to illegally and wrongfully deprive the estate, of which she was administratrix, of the right to defend against the action and suits brought by the county on an alleged wrongful claim.

City Council Meeting.

A meeting of the city council was held on Monday, with Mayor H. T. Botts and Councilmen J. P. Allen, A. T. White and M. Munson, present. Councilman J. W. Bowers' resignation was read and accepted, which leaves the first ward again without a councilman. The recorder was ordered to post notices as to assessments for street improvements. Laboring men—union men—do not see how it is that they cannot make the country believe that Haywood is a martyr, and that "we the people" should get down on our marrow bones to him, and elect him to a high office. But when you hear this cry just make up your mind that it is like the uncertain cry of the coyotes on the plains, and that a very few men are making a great deal of noise. Look at the fiasco in Denver upon the return of Haywood to that city after the trial.
