### A Challenge.

Mr. B. N. Souffer, Tillamook City.

DEAR SIR.—We are informed that you are charging us with cowardice because we refused to allow our horse to be judged by the judges selected by the stock committee of the Tillamook County Fair and Street Carnival.

In justice to those who have bred to our horse and for the protection of our business interests, we feel called upon to make public the reasons for our having declined to allow the judges selected by said committee to pass judgment upon our horse. These reasons are set forth in the following proposition submitted to you on August 23, 1907:

Tillamook, Ore., Aug. 23rd, 1907.  
Mr. M. R. Hancock, Chairman,  
Stock Committee, Tillamook County Fair and Street Carnival.

DEAR SIR.—We beg to say that in entering our draft stallion, Black Prince, we did so with the distinct understanding with your committee that the draft stallions were to be judged by residents of the state outside of Tillamook County, known to be competent horsemen and men of the strictest honor and integrity. We are advised that your committee has made an effort to secure such judges, but has failed in so doing, and has met with much difficulty in procuring competent local men to act.

In view of the conditions above stated, and in view of the interests of our horse, we testified in making the following proposition, to wit:

The owner or owners of the horse judged to be the poorest by the judges appointed by your committee shall, at the option of the owner or owners of the horse so classed, have the right of appeal to the judges of draft stallions at the State Fair of Salem, or in case of the refusal of the said judges to act, then the State Veterinary and one other veterinary of recognized ability and integrity shall be chosen to act and pass judgment on said horses. Providing, if an appeal shall be taken, the three draft stallions in competition here shall be removed to Salem or Portland, as the case may be, within thirty days from this date for the purpose of being judged.

To indicate our absolute good faith in this matter we herewith hand you a certified check for two hundred dollars, which sum we agree to forfeit for the Fair of 1908, or the Fourth of July celebration of 1908, in case we fail to be on hand at Salem or Portland as above agreed upon, with our horse, and we shall require that the owners of the other two horses shall deposit with you a check of one hundred dollars each to be used for the same purpose as the check here with handed you. Upon written acceptance by Charles Ray and B. O. Snuffer of the above proposition we will allow the judges appointed by your committee to pass judgment, otherwise we shall withdraw our horse.

This proposition was made because we wished to have an absolutely impartial decision, one not influenced in any way by local bias or prejudice.

W. H. SNUFFER.—Last year when Messrs. McWhorter, President of the State Agricultural College at Corvallis; J. W. Boney, State Food and Dairy Commissioner; and Prof. Kent, member of the faculty of the State Agricultural College, gave the blue ribbon to our horse, the red one to the Cloverdale horse, and gave our horse third prize, you accused these honorable gentlemen of bad faith. We, at that time, offered you every remedy that a reasonable man could ask, offering to submit the question to any horseman recognized as qualified to judge horses.
