Another Divorce Suit.

A divorce suit was filed in the circuit court by Mrs. Ida Anderson against her husband, Andrew Anderson. These parties were married in Portland about the 13th Sept., 1893, there being two children by the marriage. The grounds for the divorce, as set out in the complaint, is that defendant has been guilty of cruel and inhuman conduct towards the plaintiff, and that he has treated her in such a manner as to render her life burdensome. The plaintiff prays the court that she may have the care, custody, control and education of the children, Olga and Waneta, and that she may be decreed to be the owner of one-half of all the property as described in the complaint, and that the court may make such provisions for the support of the children as shall be just and proper.
