WANTS MORE TAX MONEY. Water Commission Hitches Another hydrant Onto the City

Treasury. At a meeting of the Tillamook Water Commission on Wednesday, at which Mayor H. T. Botts and Councilman W. C. King were present, called for the purpose of showing that the water commission needed the money from eight mills, but the city council had only allowed five mills. There appears to have been some little misunderstanding between the two bodies when the levy was made, the city council having the impression. he city council having the impression at the time that a five mill tax would be sufficient, which would bring in about The engineers have completed the survey on the Wilson river for the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co., which will be the main line into Tillamook for that road when it is built.
