The taxpayers who have not paid the last half of their taxes for the year 1906, and levied in January, 1907, are now payable and will become delinquent on the first Monday in October, 1907, at which time interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum will be charged, in addition to 10 per cent penalty, the interest being computed from the first Monday in April, 1907.

The assessment for Tillamook county will be over \$8,000,000 this year. The assessment on acreage property amounts to \$7,327,550 and town lots \$335,151. With the amount of assessment on personal property, which amounted to over \$500,000 last year, make the amount eight millions. Timber claims, fir and spruce, are assessed at \$2,400, and hemlock claims at \$1,500.

The annual teachers' institute for Tillamook County will be held in this city on October 9th, 10th and 11th, when State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, Hon. B. F. Mulkey, President Ashland Normal School; Miss Cornelia Mervin, secretary of the Oregon Library Commission; Superintendent H. H. Belt, of Yamhill county; Mr. Chas. H. Jones, editor of the Oregon Teachers' Monthly, will be the instructors. Two public lectures will be given by Messrs. Ackerman and Mulkey.

Another divorce case was filed in the circuit court on Friday, in which Mrs. Martha L. Mathewson vs. George S. Mathewson are the parties who show that marriage was a failure in their case. Plaintiff prays that the marriage contract existing between them be dissolved and that she be given the custody of one minor child, Florene, who is three years of age. The grounds for the divorce are that defendant took to drink and became an habitual gross drunkard, and as Mrs. Mathewson could not live with him in that condition, she left him. They were married at Kirby, in Josephine county, in 1899.

At a meeting of the city council Monday evening, with Mayor H. T. Botts and Councilmen J. P. Allen, W. C. King and G. Munson present, Oak Nolan appeared in behalf of the Tillamook Water Commission, which wanted eight mills instead of five mills of the taxes recently collected. The commission has already received \$1,517.79 from the five mills, and is now wanting the city council to allow three mills more and pay \$77.50 per month as well for water rent from last January. The councilmen could not see how they could allow that, as it would put the city that much more in debt, so the matter was allowed to drop. John Harter made a proposition to donate land in front of his property on Fifth and Sixth streets, for street purposes, provided the city council would furnish the lumber for the sidewalk and grade the street when required, was accepted. Jonas Olsen, F. Long and S. A. Brodhead were appointed a committee to assess damages to Mrs. Walker's property by the opening of these streets. An assessment for street improvement was made, that for the two business blocks on First street being 77 1/2c. per foot, or \$38.75 for 50ft. frontage, and that for the block on 2nd Av. East was 74c. per foot.

WANTS MORE TAX MONEY.

Water Commission Hitches Another Grant Onto the City Treasury.

At a meeting of the Tillamook Water Commission on Wednesday, at which Mayor H. T. Botts and Councilman W. C. King were present, called for the purpose of showing that the water commission needed the money from eight mills, but the city council had only allowed five mills. There appears to have been some little misunderstanding between the two bodies when the levy was made, the city council having the impression at the time that a five mill tax would be sufficient, which would bring in about \$1600, and if the citizens paid that amount to help out the water system, it should not pay \$930 as well for water. Things have been running along in that way since the first of the year, but the water commission now find that it is in need of more money and could use several thousand dollars to good advantage in extension work. President Brodhead having stated the financial condition of the water system and the need of more money, the consensus of opinion was that the city council ought to allow the commission the additional three mills, or pay the water rent for the year, which is now \$77.50 per month. As there appeared no other way to help the water commission out of its financial difficulties and it being a city matter, Mayor Botts and Councilman King consented to pay the water rent, which will give, with the five mill tax, about \$2,500 towards helping the water system out this year from taxation. Last year the water system cost the city \$2,109 in taxation. Commissioner Goodspeed asked several times "What kind of a shape will it leave the city in?" but not one of the commissioners undertook to solve it. Mayor Botts did say, however, that it was going to put the city that much more in debt.

Suit Filed Over Railroad Lands.

Suit to compel the Southern Pacific Company to sell a tract of 160 acres, situated in Columbia County and included in the railroad's land grant, was filed in the Federal Court in Portland on Monday. The plaintiff is John L. Snyder, of Columbia County, and the defendants are the Oregon & California Railroad Company, the Union Trust Company, S. T. Gage, N. T. Smith and W. E. Brown, trustees, they being the holders of a trust mortgage on the land. Snyder filed on the land July 30, last, and subsequently tendered the railroad company \$400 in payment for the quarter section. The offer was refused, and Snyder now seeks to enforce the sale of the land by the company for a consideration of \$2.50 an acre, according to the terms of the grant by which Congress transferred about 6,000,000 acres of land to the corporation by the acts of April 10, 1869, and May 4, 1870. The papers were served on the railroad people on Monday, and they will be required to make an appearance when the United States Circuit Court is convened on the first Monday in October. The filing of the suit will bring to an issue and a legal determination the controversy over the holding of these lands by the railroad company. It has been contended by the Government, and by settlers who are eager to acquire these lands, that the terms of the grant by which this immense acreage was transferred to the corporation, require the sale of the land in tracts of not to exceed 160 acres each at \$2.50 an acre.
