TILLAMOOK COUNTY BANK

C. A. Rhea, president of the Tillamook County Bank, which was organized by L. W. McAdams, of Pendleton; and William Hughes and G. Y. Harry, of Portland, came in the first of the week to look over the county, and like a large number of Oregonians who visit Tillamook for the first time, are surprised to find it such a wonderful county, rich in undeveloped resources. Mr. Snuffer was instrumental in bringing these gentlemen visit Tillamook.

Articles of incorporation were filed in the county clerk's office on Wednesday, which will give Tillamook county another toll road, incorporating what is to be called the Nestucca Toll Road Company. The incorporators are D. L. Jones, Chas. O. Farnsworth and Robert A. Jones, the capital stock of the company being placed at \$8,000. It is the purpose of the company to engage in the construction and operation of a road from Blaine in Tillamook County, following down the course of what is known as Coast Creek in Yamhill county, and to intersect the county road at this place. It has been contended for a number of years that one of the best grades can be found into Tillamook county over this route for travel from Yamhill county, making the distance about ten miles shorter than the present toll road. It is expected to have the road completed by next spring and will be in good shape for next summer's travel. It is stated that it is the intention only to collect toll in the summer months.

Carries Railroad Supplies.

Loaded with steel rails for six miles of railroad, other track equipment, and the cylinder piers for three steel bridges, the big barge, Wallcut, will leave Portland this week for Tillamook Bay. This is the second shipment of supplies for the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company's line to the Tillamook county. The Wallcut is now receiving her cargo at the Albina dock. The cylinder piers will probably be taken on at the Marine Iron Works, St. John, where they were manufactured. It is expected she will leave down by Saturday at the latest.

Already 800 rails, weighing 25 tons have been lifted into the hold of the barge. In the shipment being made by the railroad company are also 5000 machine bolts, 300 eggs of track spikes, 400 rolls of barbed wire, ten kegs of staples and 15,000 cast separators. Robert W. Wallcut, the contractor on the Tillamook division, is sending down by the Wallcut the second strain shovel for Tillamook Bay. Weighing 45 tons, the whole thing can be lifted to the deck of the barge without difficulty by the new derrick at the Albina dock.

The cylinder piers are for the steel bridges across the Miami, Kichis and Wilson rivers, three of the five streams that flow into Tillamook Bay. Work on the Miami bridge was begun last week. The tug Samson will probably tow the Wallcut to Tillamook Bay.
