The Facts About the Trial of the Fishermen.

As we have noticed an article in the Herald perhaps written by some one for the purpose of an advertisement. Permit us to just simply state the facts as they occurred at the trial.
N. McMillin testified that witness name was on the books of the Elmore Cannery Co., as one of the fishermen delivering fish.
Mike Peterson, the man who delivers the fish to the cannery for the various fishermen on the bay, testified that he delivered fish for Wilson at the Cannery.
Mr. Tomlinson testified that he saw Wilson catching fish in a set net, but he did not say he was 400 yards away. In fact, there was nothing in his testimony as to how far he was, only that he said he was a neighbor of Wilson and had seen him fishing at various times.
Frank C. Brown, the deputy fish warden, testified that Wilson did not have a license.
Wilson did not deny the charge, nor did he say he did not fish.
As a matter of fact after the jury acquitted him he told them he did not have a license.
In closing will say Perhaps the jury may have thought that the fishermen were not treated altogether fair as it had been the custom heretofore to give them time to procure their license after commencing no fish, and not hold them down to the exact letter of the law, but as to the evidence as produced at the trial we leave it to the public with our comment.

KNOWS MEN WHO MURDERED BROWN.

Miner is Arrested at Granite for Crime.

A stranger giving the name of Frank Tucker was taken into custody at Granite Tuesday on suspicion of being an accomplice in the murder of Harvey K. Brown. At the time of his arrest he was intoxicated and made very damaging statements as to the case. Sheriff Rand was at once communicated with at Baker City, and instructed Special Officer Thornburg to take him to Sumpter and turn him over to the officers.
In Tucker's statement he admitted that he was in Baker City the night of the explosion and that he knew the men who set off the bomb, but he will not tell their names.
He says that he saw the bomb and that it was made of nitro-glycerine and white pine sawdust and was set off by wires. He also says that he was 40 yards from the bomb when it was set off, that he ran down by the freight depot and afterwards out of Baker towards Sumpter, arriving in Austin the second day, worked there four days and walked to Granite Monday. The two others intended going to Cheyenne, Wyo.
He says that he has worked in mines at Butte and at different camps in Colorado; that he is a member of the Western Federation of Miners, also that he has relatives living at Scio.
After he was taken in charge by the officers he dictated a letter to his brother at Scio, in which he said he had got in a bad scrape, and made an appeal for assistance.
Tucker is about 30 years old, about 5 feet, 7 inches high, of light complexion, dressed in working clothes with heavy miners' shoes—but not mates. He will be held till his confession is verified, as Sheriff Rand says he must not overlook any clues.

The Lusitania, which left Queenstown at 10:25 Sunday morning for New York, is in approximately latitude 51.5 degrees north, longitude 15.08 degrees west at 9 p.m. Sunday. From Daunt's Rock the steamer averaged 23.36 knots per hour. The wind was westerly, rain was falling and a heavy sea was running. It was understood that the Lusitania was attempting to make a record. The vibration was marked.

"I witnessed a most unusual accident the other evening in Louisville," said Betram Holmes, of St. Louis, at the Hotel Duncan. "Seated at the dining tables with me was a young couple who were very spoony. The young fellow in some manner swallowed three false teeth. He let out a howl.
