 Mayor Botts presided at a meeting on Friday evening, called for the purpose of formulating plans in getting the free public library started. Several representative citizens were present and it was reported that \$201.50 had been subscribed and that it was thought another \$100 could be added to the list. It was decided to use the city hall for the reading room and library until more suitable quarters could be obtained, and to expend \$150 on books from the money subscribed. *

The Home Telephone Company applied for a telephone franchise, but owing to the holidays was continued until the next meeting. *
 Colonel S. W. Roessler, Corps of Engineers, came in on Sunday on an official visit. He went to Cape Meares Light Station on Monday morning and in the afternoon Captain J. Groat took him down Hoquarton Slough and the bay, where he had a fine opportunity of seeing the condition of the slough and bay as the tide was suitable for that purpose. In the evening Colonel Roessler met with a few members of the Port of Tillamook Commission in the parlors of the Allen House, and the conditions here were fully explained and gone over. Colonel Roessler holds out no hope of the improvement of Tillamook bay with the present limited appropriations and what improvements are to be made will be in the slough and in the bay. He was desirous of knowing what improvements the Port of Tillamook Commission especially wished attended to

first. Owing to the sickness of his wife the colonel left somewhat hurriedly on Tuesday morning. *
 The railroad situation in Tillamook county has caused a good deal of excitement, owing to the order last week which put a stop to the work on the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company. Several hundred men who came in last week have taken their departure, the last bunch of about 125 leaving on Sunday morning, walking out by way of the Grand Round. All material and tools are being put away in good shape for the winter, and as soon as the steam shovels can get through protecting work which will take about another two weeks, all work will cease, until, it is thought, next spring. A general exodus of those employed on the railroad have been going on ever since the shut down order went into effect. President E. E. Lytle and Engineer G. L. Davis, of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co., are expected in on Saturday, when, probably they will be able to throw some light on the situation and give citizen's committee some assurance that the railroad will be built and in operation according to contract. *
