Speculators are the only ones who find no comfort when the financial situation is fairly analyzed. The Alaskans are vigorously demanding a territorial form of government, and according to the general opinion of the people of the United States they are right. A Chinese paper has suspended publication after a career of 995 years. It is a pity the long felt want could not have been stretched a little longer so as to cover a 1000th anniversary. A man who sells a good crop of apples in these times and puts the money in railroad securities feels that Wall street does not always manage to get the big end of a bargain. As a means of averting panics the financiers are demanding a flexible currency. If such a system will enable the banks to loosen up a little the people will be glad to favor it. In feeding cows for the dairy, quality, rather than quantity, counts. Over feed produces more fat than milk, and gives the cow indigestion, the result of an overworked stomach. American meat, flour and other foodstuffs are being exchanged for gold in all the markets of the world. If Europe can be educated up to allitia Uncle Sam will have complete control of the financial situation. The president has just added 490,451 acres to the national forests in California which now include the Calaveras big trees and the Yosemite Valley. In forestry the president's idea is that the way to begin is to begin. It is the cow that is up in good flesh that does her best. When she is thin and hungry all the time, she will surely put the biggest part of what you give her to eat on her back. That means less for you in the pail and in the butter tub. Some of the pundits differ as to whether the volume of currency is insufficient, or the rate of interest is too low, or that the source of derangement must be sought elsewhere. The doctors disagree, and the patient should not be impatient. A socialistic colony announced in the State of Washington is to have 3000 acres of land, with water rights from five lakes and \$300,000 capital. The professional promoter is evidently not in the scheme. He would have slung in at least three more ciphers. "There is just as much money in the country as ever there was. There is just as much property as ever. The land and the mines are as productive as ever. Upon the whole, there were never so many people before who were free from debt." Such is the comment of a San Francisco paper on the financial situation. If that town feels cheerful the rest of the country should be calm and confident. Commissioner of Health Dixon of Pennsylvania has inaugurated a campaign against tuberculosis involving a house to house inspection and instruction by visiting nurses, who will go to the home of every person applying to the State Dispensary for treatment. It will be the duty of the visiting nurses to instruct the patient and the patient's family how to obtain the requisite amount of fresh air, the most desirable foods, and how to conduct themselves so as to avoid infection. Every member of a household in which a consumptive lives will be inspected, and where there is a sign of ill health the suspected person will be persuaded to adopt precautionary measures. In this way it is hoped the state will be able to check the spread of "the great white plague" by discovering hundreds of cases in the early stages when a cure is probable. The difficulty which has been experienced in sanitarium work heretofore is that cases are not reached until they are too far advanced to be susceptible of cure. Twelve hundred people of Augusta, Maine, revolting at the high prices of meat, have resolved themselves into a vegetarian society. Each is pledged to eat no meat for ten days, hoping in that time to force the hard hearted butchers to better terms. It is curious to speculate on what would happen if all the people of the United States should do likewise and not eat a bite of meat for two weeks. In that time there would be such an accumulation of stock that the storage houses could not hold it and it would inevitably glut the market to repletion. When it is remembered how many good things there are to eat, besides beef, pork or mutton, it would seem to be quite easy to organize an anti-meat crusade that would count. While everybody in this country eats meat, it is not at all indispensable, nor is it essential to health. Many millions of Asiatics go from year to year without eating any fish but fish and poultry, and but little of that. In this country there are hundreds of nutri-
