**Tillamook Jottings.**

The board of county commissioners, which met last week for the purpose of transacting county business, finding that it was illegal to do business while Governor Chamberlain was proclaiming holidays in the interests of the banks, capitulated on Friday, the commissioners returning to their homes until the holiday season is over.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore left this city on Sunday, her passenger list from here being A. Fausler, Mr. and Miss Harold, C. E. Olsen, J. M. Blackburn, A. Benson and wife, W. Inch and wife, W. H. Huston and wife, C. A. Kurr, E. Stanley, Mrs. Thayer and daughter, two Sisters, H. C. Whittier and wife, and J. C. Yale and daughter.

On Saturday the local banks issued clearing house certificates, which went into general circulation and were taken at the stores. At first some few persons were sceptical about receiving them, but when it was understood that there was \$1.50 security deposited with the clearing house committee for every dollar issued, it removed all doubt as to their value.

Engineer Geo. L. Davis, of the Pacific Railway & Navigation Co., met with the right of way committee on Monday evening, and representing President Lytle, requested an extension of time for the completion of the railroad from the 31st December, 1908, to the 1st November, 1909, making the time two years hence. The situation was fully gone over, and under the circumstances the committee decided to extend the time.

Monday last was the time to hold the regular November term of the circuit court, but no court was called because all courts are "held up," no matter how important it may be to the public and litigants, as Governor Chamberlain is proclaiming holidays from day to day in the interest of the banks. The docket is long and contains 33 cases, and Judge Geo. H. Burnett had arranged to give the rest of his time this month to the circuit court in this county. Should the governor decide to continue the holidays for the remainder of the month, it is more than probable that all the cases will go over until April, for the holidays will upset dates for holding circuit court in other counties as well. When the jurors put in an appearance on Monday they were ordered to appear one day after the holidays ceased. Jurors are now paid \$3 and their mileage.

The friends of Mrs. Srethna S. Phelps, formerly of Netarts, will be sorry to hear of the accident which happened to her near Canyon City, Ore. Mrs. Phelps had gone there to make final proof on a timber claim. She took the stage at Canyon City early on the morning of Nov. 3rd, and after passing John Day the stage turned over. There were nine passengers, but no one was badly hurt, except Mrs. Phelps, who was thrown against the iron and wood work, cutting her head badly. She obtained a rig and returned to Canyon City, where Dr. Ashford attended to her injuries, a deep cut four inches long over the eyes. Her left arm was bruised and sprained so bad she could not use it. Mrs. Phelps will not

be able to return to Portland for a week or longer on account of the accident. She is stopping at the Elkhorn Hotel at Canyon City, of which Sam Bauer is the proprietor.

**Merchants National Suspends.**

Owing to false reports being circulated in Portland about the Merchants' National Bank, a run was made on the bank for several weeks and it had to suspend payment on Tuesday. The bank had deposits exceeding \$5,000,000. Within the past six weeks it has paid out deposits to the extent of \$2,300,000. The last two weeks it paid out \$1,500,000. The bank will be opened again as soon as it can gather in its assets, which are ample to pay all depositors.

**Editorial Snap Shots.**

It must be that the political liars have found a new occupation by turning bank liars.

There is no cause of much alarm, for the country has just gone through another speculator's panic.

There is one good thing about the governor's holiday proclamations. It has stopped the divorce grist mill.

We do not think that Oregon needs so many legal holidays, for the people do not appear to have the spring fever.

Don't get down in the mouth because work on the railroad is stopped. Tillamook county has always been a good place to live in, anyway.

Well! Well! Well! We never thought that republicans would take to democratic shin plaster (clearing house certificates) as readily as ducks take to water.

Some persons are foolish enough to report around that the government will make good what money depositors may lose in a national bank. The government does nothing of the kind.

We move that Governor Chamberlain be fined for contempt of court for "holding up" the courts of the state, and we forthwith proceed to impose the fine by giving the governor a holiday himself so that the wheels of justice can proceed.

The Headlight is opposed to Governor Chamberlain's holiday proclamations, for the reason that we are opposed to any system that is a special privilege to any one class of individuals. The holidays are declared to help out the banks, to tide over a financial crisis. If we do not miss our guess, Governor Chamberlain's continuous holiday proclamations are the biggest scars sows, bugaboos that could happen to the banks of the state. But, on the other hand, suppose it had been a number of dairymen who were in a tight place, or the sheriff was about to sell people's property at public auction, would the governor have proclaimed holidays from day to day. An-

other thing in regard to the special privileges to the banks which is not right or just, and that is it stops state courts, legal business, county courts, probate court and other public proceedings, putting people to inconvenience and expense as well.

Governor Chamberlain seems to have been the first person to suggest that State Treasurer Steel should resign because he had not obtained sufficient security when he placed state money in the defunct Title Guarantee & Trust Company. We think that Governor Chamberlain ought to resign also, for in declaring legal holidays to help the banks out he made it impossible for Steel to obtain the securities legally, which he went to the bank for and obtained. If Steel made a blunder, so also did Chamberlain when he made it impossible for Steel to safeguard the state's funds by declaring a legal holiday.
