He was married some years ago to Miss Rose Weatherly, niece of Sim Earl, who, with her two children, while on their way to Tillamook, were drowned when the Columbia went down after being in collision last August.

At an inter-society debate, held at the High School on Friday, John Aschim, Albert Bramwell and Robert Stillwell won the privilege of representing the school in the debate with Astoria High School. A debate library has been secured from the State Library Association, and hard work is being done in preparation for the debate, the date of which will be announced later.

Monday night three young fellows tore off some boards and entered the editor's barn, and made a raid on five turkeys. They made their exit through the manure door, carrying away three turkeys, but in their hurry dropped one, which had been killed. It is now in order to make a raid on the thieves and if they get their hides punctured with lead they will be getting what they richly deserve. There was almost a shooting mess only a few weeks ago when some parties were raiding a chicken house in the east part of the city.

The Tillamook Concert Band furnished some excellent band music at their concert on Friday evening, for which they are deserving of a great deal of credit. Since the band was reorganized the boys have not neglected their practice, and after months of steady training, it is now able to furnish some fine music. The vocalists were Mrs. G. K. Parrish and Miss Lillian Anderson, both of whom were encored. J. W. Anderson gave a piccolo solo and G. K. Parrish a clarinet solo, which were well rendered and encored. "Courtship under difficulties" proved laughable, so did the quartette "Cooper's Chorus," in which N. Parrish was the star performer, while the other parts on program were well received.

We have to announce the death of I. T. Mautsby, which occurred on the 18th instant at the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg, where he was taken a few years ago from this county. He was a war veteran and one of the early settlers of Tillamook, and served the county as county school superintendent and justice of the peace. He was amongst the first teachers to teach school in this county, and being well educated and an attorney he rose to some prominence in the early days of the county. He was a judge under the old territorial law at Vancouver, which gave him a license to practice law. He married a widow in Yamhill county, but soon after she obtained a divorce. He came to Tillamook about 1876 and remained here until he was taken to the Soldiers' Home about three years ago.

Merle D. Nelson is Dead.

Merle D. Nelson, founder and former editor of the Cloverdale Courier, died of tuberculosis Saturday evening, near Porterville, Cal., where he went about two months ago. Mr. Nelson was born on a farm in the Webfoot neighborhood, six or eight miles from McMinnville, about 22 years ago, and moved to McMinnville with his parents in early childhood. After graduation from the high school and the commercial department of McMinnville College he served an apprenticeship on the News Reporter, of McMinnville, owned at that time by D. I. Asbury. Nearly three years ago he went to Cloverdale, in Tillamook County and embarked in the newspaper field, having the distinction of being the youngest editor in the state. He was fast rising to prominence when he contracted a severe cold, last winter, from which he never recovered. The body will be taken to McMinnville for burial.
