Consider the Source, Mr. Todd.

DEAR SIR,—In this week's issue of the Herald, under the head of "The Observer," is this statement:

"I observe that your county hired men have published their semi-annual reports. We understand from it that there is over one thousand dollars in the road fund in the hands of the Treasurer, yet it is also reported that county road warrants are not being being paid, and are drawing interest. You are paying that interest."

As County Treasurer I have sole control of the funds referred to, and the article reflects on myself alone.

The report mentioned was filed with the County Clerk on October 9th, 1907, and plainly states that it is the amount on hand for the term ending September, 30th, 1907, and shows \$1,027.15 in the road fund and \$4,277.15 in the general fund.

The \$4,277.15 in the general fund was being held for the purpose of paying the State tax, due in November, amounting to \$4,458.75, and was not applicable to the redemption of county warrants, as stated in the semi-annual reports, and the money in the road fund was paid out on warrants as they were presented, until the whole amount, with the exception of three cents, was paid out, when the first warrant amounting to over \$400 was endorsed for want of funds, and this was not until January 3rd, 1908.

Furthermore, there is not now, or has there ever been any interest paid out by the county, on any warrants of any kind, while there was money in the hands of the County Treasurer to pay them. I challenge "Observer" to produce any person in Tillamook county who can show that any order on any fund has not been paid when presented when there was money to pay the same.
